A committee of four, W. D. Brooks, E. E. Heslin and J. Jonas, with Dr. Jepson chairman, was appointed to make investigation concerning the installment of a water system.

Two plans are under consideration one is a system with local springs as a source and the other is Bull Run water.

**CAPT. CHAS. WANZER  
PASSES AWAY SUDDENLY**

The body of Captain Charles Wanzer was discovered at his home near Bairdsdale station on Monday, September 19, about noon, by Mr. Rice of Fairview, who has been working on Captain Wanzer's place.

From all appearances Captain Wanzer died suddenly and without a struggle. He had passed Sunday evening in Fairview at the home of Paul Osburn and on his return to his home was apparently preparing to retire when he was stricken. He had been winding his watch, which fell upon his body and did not even slip to the floor.

Captain Wanzer was 75 years old. He was a railway engineer and served for several years with the O. W. R. & N. company. In an early day he was with the Union Pacific company in St. Paul. He leaves a son, Chas. W., of Portland, an assistant engineer of the state highway commission, and two daughters, Mrs. Alexander Botkin of Estacada and Mrs. Chester R. Bradford of Evanston, Illinois. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

It cost the county about \$800 to free the district of the pests but it was money well expended for no greater disaster could happen to the potato growers than a spread of the Colorado or eastern potato bug.
