ference journal and the Powell Valley circuit as such had ceased to exist. At that time G. F. Rounds was pastor at Cleone and J. H. Wood at Gresham.

Fire destroyed the parsonage at Gresham in 1901 and wiped out the records of the Powell Valley circuit from 1884 to that time.

Pastors on the Powell Valley circuit from its organization in 1876 were P. Elliot, S. E. Searle, T. M. Reese, C. Alderson, C. G. Ferguson, W. T. Chapman, J. H. Wood, John G. Tate and possibly two or three others.
