FARMERS AGREE TO WAIT FOR NEW COMPANY

Inclined can hold out and when the line is erected can then secure service by paying the regular rates. In the new proposition the company puts up the entire line and all pay the regular rent per month after the service is installed and there is no money to be advanced to the company for erecting the line.

Rev. John Larson, B. W. Howell, H. A. Frenna, H. G. Mullenhoff and Ned Nelson were appointed as a committee to take the matter up. Mr. Johanson was invited to attend also. This committee will meet with the manager of the Northwestern Electric company on Monday morning, October 10, and they will report the result of the meeting at another special meeting called at the Orient grange hall on the same evening, (October 10) to hear the report of the committee. It is hoped and expected that when the report of last evening's meeting reaches the company that they will make extra effort to serve a community that is standing so solidly for service from their company. Only one vote was registered in favor of this committee visiting the P. R. L. & P. to find out what terms they would give, although Mr. Gifford urged that consideration be given the fact that his company were not promising lights in less time than six months while the P. R. L. & P. could put the main lines through in less than that many weeks.

C. H. Johanson also said that representatives of the company had visited him during the day and that while he had no definite statements to make he was assured that the P. R. L. & P. would put up a much better proposition. The use of oil lamps was mentioned and one man said that since they had used oil lamps for 20 years he thought they should be willing to wait six months longer and he was in favor of doing so. The applause which greeted this statement was such that no further evidence was needed to show that the people want lights but they want the Northwestern to have a chance to put them in on the pay-as-you-use basis.

SWEDISH CHURCH WILL HAVE BIG CONFERENCE

A meeting of unusual interest to Swedish people in this vicinity will be the semi-annual conference of the Swedish Mission conference of the Pacific Northwest, which will meet in the Powell Valley church on Wednesday evening, October 5, and which will continue for the remainder of the week, ending with a service in the English language on Sunday evening, October 9. This meeting will call together about 15 ministers of the northwest states and a large number of laymen. There will be two sessions each forenoon, two each afternoon and one in the evening while the conference lasts.
