LEVEL-HEADED BANKER'S STATEMENT.

A. L. Mills of Portland First National Bank has become a national authority on financial conditions in 20 years. As a young man he humbly started life in the chicken business.

He has just attended the quarterly federal reserve bank conference at Washington, D. C., and as representative of the twelfth federal reserve district, notes slowly improving business conditions.

He is of the opinion that there will be no great improvement until the European situation is cleared up, and banks will continue to discourage borrowing for purely speculative purposes. He made the following apparently level-headed statements: "Responsible borrowers can get money in all the financial centers for legitimate purposes, but bankers turn a deaf ear to all those wishing to borrow for speculation."

"Corporations and business houses that have liquidated their old indebtedness, marked off their losses and put their inventories down to a rock bottom basis have no difficulty in getting credit."

"Crops are being marketed in an orderly, but rapid manner, liquidation of debt is taking place, even though the returns to the farmer and grower are unsatisfactory."
