ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE
AIDS LAW ENFORCEMENT

Ten thousand days have been served in jail, and \$20,000 imposed in fines in the courts of Oregon during the last 12 months as a result of the activities of the two state agents of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league. This is a result of 1000 complaints which the league has received during the year, according to W. J. Herwig, superintendent.

The report shows 150 raids were made, 100 stills confiscated and destroyed and 100 convictions secured. In addition a large number of cases are still pending in the courts. Herwig estimates that his agents have destroyed \$30,000 worth of bootleggers' and moonshiners' property during the year. The number of gallons of liquor confiscated and turned over to the courts is not known.

The main object of the Anti-Saloon league is to create a wholesome public sentiment for law enforcement, explained Herwig. Where officials are found to be enforcing the law the league attempts to make it still easier and more popular to enforce the law by crystallizing public sentiment to uphold and back law enforcement officers. On the other hand, an effort is made to remove those who fail to live up to their oath of office.

Herwig has also found that his office is receiving more complaints than public prosecutors, because his agents have refused to divulge the source of their information. Some embarrassing court situations have been caused as a result of public officials revealing the name of their informant, he said.

"Believing that a mere fine is only a cheap license, we have been urging judges to impose a heavy jail sentence," Herwig said. "The results have been exceedingly gratifying, as judges all over the state are now giving heavy jail sentences."

"The league is cooperating with our department at Washington in the passage of the bill extending national prohibition to every American in all countries where the United States is represented. This will prevent any American from engaging in the liquor business in China, Japan and all other countries where our government is represented. The passage of this bill will be a tremendous victory. The national league, through its legislative department at Washington, is seeking to secure additional national law enforcement legislation, materially strengthening the Volstead law, in which we are also cooperating."—From the Oregon Journal.
