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HOW TO PROVIDE EMPLOYMENT

Locally the unemployment problem is not a very serious matter, thanks to the agricultural character of our surroundings and the steadiness and solidity of our growth. The financial condition of the country has of course caused a noticeable showing up of many local industries and of all business.

Gresham business men and citizens generally are to be congratulated on their firm faith in the future and efforts to go ahead even while business in general is almost at a standstill. There is manifest a commendable hopefulness and plans are being laid for enlargements in various lines to be undertaken just as soon as financial conditions warrant.

The new factory being completed here with the backing of local citizens is evidence of what we have said.

It is known that another large industry is seeking a location here though it is not possible to make definite announcement concerning it. If it comes through it will mean a considerable addition to the local capital invested and local pay rolls.

The future prosperity of this portion of the state or this portion of the county is not wholly dependent on the 1925 fair. The rising tide is seen approaching. Financial experts and economists see it coming and investors are preparing to meet it. It is anticipated the wave will flow full and strong in three or four years. The 1925 fair is planned to take advantage of the wave of prosperity. Some great and growing city will hold a great exposition at about that time. Why not Portland?

But apart from this anticipation and plan the present needs must be met.

The Outlook suggests that to meet the present stock conditions three things are necessary to keep in mind. (1) Cut off all luxuries and unnecessary expenditures.

(2) Spend all the money possible for necessities and make safe local investments.

(3) Spend the money at home or as near home as possible.

This policy will help to cut down taxes, put capital and labor at work and strengthen the local industries on which the welfare of the community depends.

HALTING DEATH AT THE BORDERS.

The great famine of last winter and spring in China has been followed, as usual, by plague. The equally great famine in Russia will, according to precedent, be followed by plague in that land. And when it is remembered that the worst of all epidemics—the Black Death—came from Russia in the fourteenth century, the prospect is not a pleasant one.

But the views—almost the promises—of expert physicians are reassuring. They say that these plagues cannot again devastate the western nations, that the deadly germs will fall to break through the armor that medicine and quarantine will build up.

Already the experts of the western nations are strengthening their lines. The Chinese plague is being held in Asia. Although the Russian epidemic is still in its infancy, measures are being taken to halt it and kill it at the border of Poland, Bohemia and Hungary.

Intelligent people in America are well acquainted with the success of the medical and quarantine scientists, in keeping down contagion in the enormous armies of Europe and the United States during the last war, and they are quite willing to take their word for it now that the future plagues will not reach our shores.

It is necessary to be on the watch, and use all preventative means possible.
