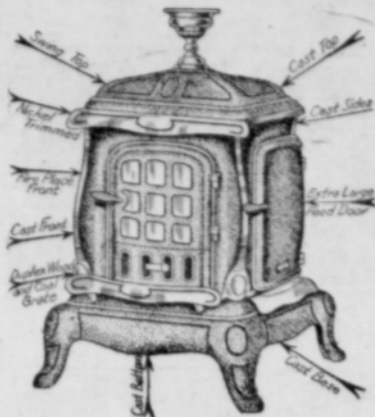


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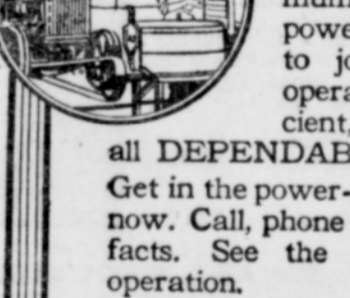
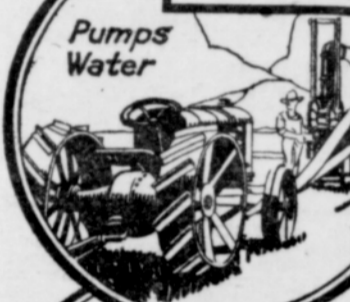
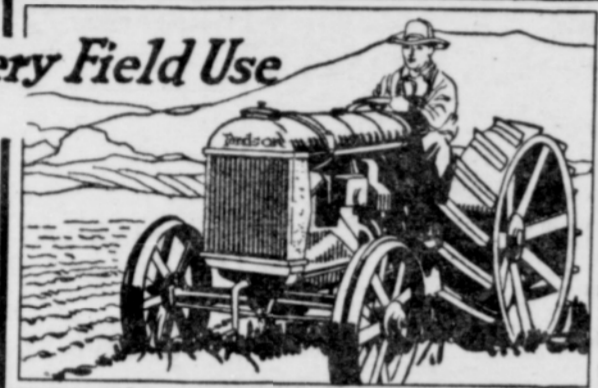
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### PLEASANT HOME

### TIMELY NOTES FROM O. A. C.

The earliest peas marked in several Willamette Valley towns are grown from fall sown seed. Seeding should be done now for the peas should be well up before the continuous cold rains occur. Alaska is a good variety for fall sowing, according to the O. A. C. Experiment Station. The ground should be fertilized with manure and drained naturally to shed excessive moisture.

Now is the time to lay in a supply of seed potatoes for next season's use. Certified seed and other seed of good quality may be secured at this time. It is probable that good potato prices will stimulate production next year with the result that there may be a seed shortage next spring. Many may then be led to plant inferior small potatoes called "single drops." Three typical hills dug from a field infested with mosaic this year produced a total of five potatoes, four of them big enough for single drops. The yield per acre on these hills was at the rate of 25 bushels, while an adjoining hill that was healthy had six marketable potatoes or a rate of nearly 500 bushels per acre. The planting of single drops coming from disease infested hills is certain to result in seriously reduced yields.

Fall plowing of upland vegetable gardens make it possible for the land to be worked earlier the following spring. Many western Oregon soils in the home gardens are such as to be benefited by lying rough during the winter exposed to frost. A coating of straw manure turned under the top surface of soil will help to prevent excessive leaching.

Now is the time to hill select potatoes for seed. Choose only healthy, vigorous plants that are not next to a diseased hill.

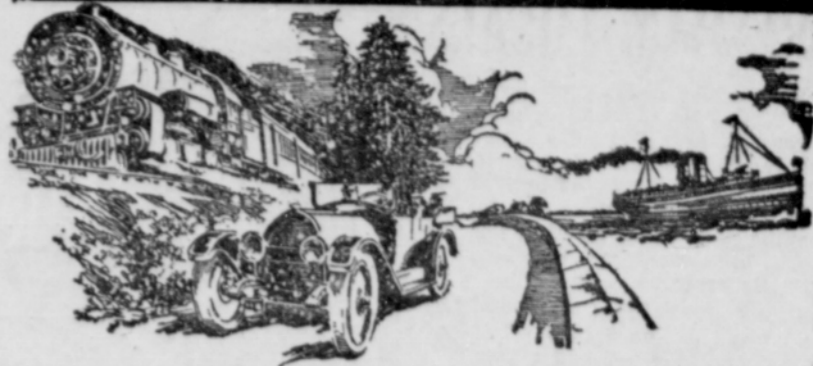

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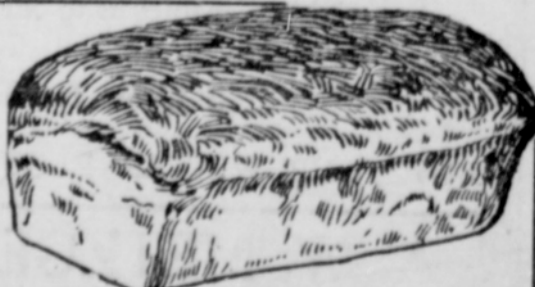
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### PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION.
