**Application Blanks in Mail for '22 Licenses**

Application blanks for 1922 automobile licenses have been received by a great many local people during the past week or ten days. The Secretary of State is sending these application blanks out much earlier than usual this year in order that the license plates may be sent out before January 1, 1922. By promptly returning these application blanks motor vehicle owners will avoid much trouble, annoyance and unnecessary delay. Deferring applying for licenses until about the first of the year only congests the work of the Secretary of State's office and may result in the arrest of the car owners by traffic officers for failure to have the 1922 licenses on their cars after January first next.

License plates for 1922 will have a yellow back ground and black figures and letters.

It is likely that the rules will be more stringent this year and that the usual week or ten days grace will not be allowed.
