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**"APHRODITE" GORGEOUS
IN STAGE EFFECTS**

Final arrangements have been completed by Morris Gest for the presentation of the super-spectacle "Aphrodite" at the Heilig Theater, Portland for three days commencing Thursday evening, November 10th, with a matinee on Saturday.

This romance of ancient Egypt, presented on a scale of great magnificence by F. Ray Comstock and Morris Gest, with a cast of 300 people, promises to be the sensation of the year in Columbus just as it was last winter in New York and is now in Chicago where at the auditorium it is playing to the biggest receipts in the history of that mammoth playhouse.

"Aphrodite" is a gorgeous and brilliant staging on a massive scale of one of the most celebrated romances known to modern fiction. The original story by Pierre Louys, a Frenchman, was a sensation. Various versions, in English, much subdued, have been printed for private circulation, but the story remained chiefly in libraries until Pierre Frondaie made the dramatic version which was such a sensation in Paris that Mary Garden afterwards appeared in it in Grand Opera. Then George C. Hazleton was engaged by Morris Gest, who brought the American rights, to adapt the play for the American stage. It was produced last December in New York and was the biggest theatrical sensation known in a generation. Now the original company and mammoth production consisting of ten stage pictures of gorgeous splendor will be brought to Portland intact.

"Aphrodite" is partly historical and partly fiction. The two historical characters are Demetrios, a sculptor, whose mutilated statue of Aphrodite still is exhibited as one of the prizes of the Louvre in Paris, and Berenike, Queen of Egypt, at the period of the novel, 69 B. C. Demetrios is loved by Berenike, but he repulses her advances because of his pure love for his statue of Aphrodite, only to fall a victim to the wiles of Chrysis, a courtesan of Alexandria, and the most notorious of women from the Temple of Aphrodite.

Mail orders for "Aphrodite" are now being received at the Heilig Theater where in order to protect the public from unscrupulous speculators following the attraction from city to city and who in New York last winter charged as high as \$200 a seat, the number of tickets allowed each person must be limited to six unless satisfactory credentials are shown.

"Aphrodite" represents an outlay of between \$250,000 and \$300,000 to its producers and is performing on a scale of magnificence never before attempted in any theater in the world.

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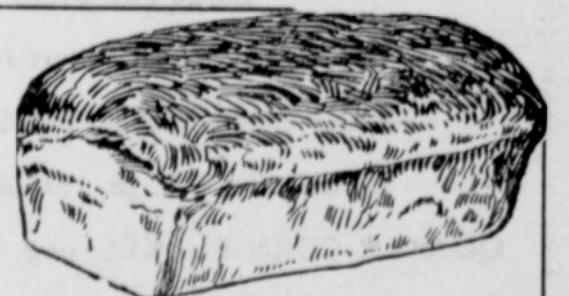
