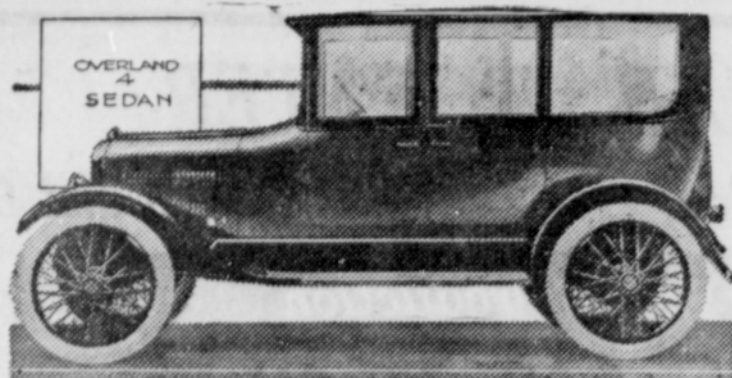

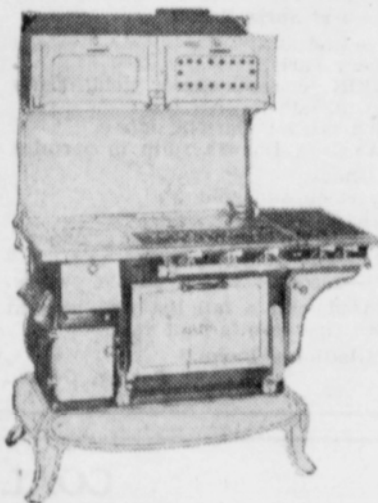

Mrs. Andresen, who is very ill, is under medical attention in Portland.

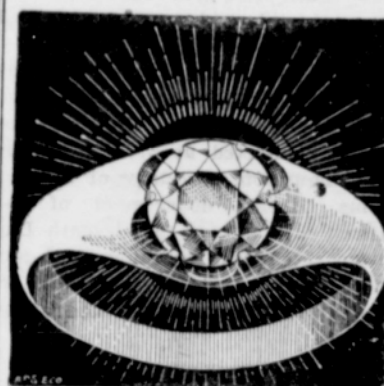

A Sacred Profession

THE sacredness of our profession is often overlooked by the average observer, but not by the bereaved. As we stand, with hands shading our mind's eye, watching the ascent of that soul to the welcoming arms of the All Wise, no earthly thought should intrude.

This is no place for jarring sound or circumstance, no place for ill-advised movement, or unforeseen interruption. Every movement must be planned, every step measured in advance, every possible accident forestalled.

Nothing of the last sacred rite can be left to chance. Only experience should attend us now, and taste and tact of the highest. Such movements require trained supervision to leave with memory the impression of reverence.

All this we humbly endeavor to do.
