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### HOUSEWARMING CALLS OUT SCHOOL PATRONS

The Union school house of district No. 26, Clackamas county, presented a gay scene on Saturday evening, October 23, the occasion being a "housewarming," the first entertainment and neighborhood gathering held in the new building. In fact, the first affair of its kind ever held in the community.

The Hallowe'en idea was cleverly carried out. Ghosts were much in evidence, a group of them receiving at the door. Likewise, the old witch was present with her broom and created much merriment with her fortune telling and queer antics.

Jack o' lanterns aided in lighting the stage, which was adorned with orange and black festoons, black cats and witches.

The program was put on by the school and included some rather spooky numbers, the weirdest of all, perhaps, being the ghost drill by the older pupils, given with the lights subdued and accompanied by music, which, to put it mildly, was very solemn and fitting. A special treat was the solo, "Shadows," by Miss Ehret. Superintendent Brenton Vedder, who came out to help celebrate, gave a brief talk, after which all were invited to adjourn to the basement, where a free supper, including hot coffee was served by the women of the community.

After supper, neighbors renewed acquaintance and nearly all took part in old time games until a late hour.

### WHITNEY BOYS CHORUS IS ORGANIZED HERE

A Whitney Boys chorus was organized at the grade school Saturday evening with a charter membership of over 20. It is expected that this initial membership will grow to 50 or more. Many boys are keeping their parents uncomfortable urging them to give permission for them to join. It is certain that if the parents investigate the boys will be given a chance to join. A practice meeting was held Saturday evening and a number of boys went with the Whitney Boys chorus to the livestock show Sunday where they sang with the chorus. This was a very unusual opportunity as usually several weeks at least is given to practice before the boys are allowed to sing in the big chorus.

Rev. Mr. Whitney was at the grade school at 10 o'clock Friday morning and spoke before the general assembly.

Mr. Whitney told of the organization in Spokane of the chorus in February, 1915, with only two boys. In February, 1916, the chorus had grown from a duet to 1052 boys who were regular members of the chorus. Twice the chorus made trips with special cars of five coaches. Mr. Whitney told of giving up his work as pastor of a Spokane church and of giving his entire time to the work with the chorus.

Chorus work has been organized in Seattle, last December in Portland and later in smaller towns and cities all working toward a chorus of 20,000 boys for the World's Fair in 1925.

The cost of joining the organization is small, only 50c for a life membership. If a boy for instance joins in one city his membership is good in any town or city in which a chorus is organized. Ten cents per week is charged for practice work.

The expense is small and the benefits aside from the musical training is of great benefit. Traveling expenses are paid for the boys and their membership card will give them from a 10 to 15 per cent discount on their clothes at several places in Portland, Mr. Whitney said.
