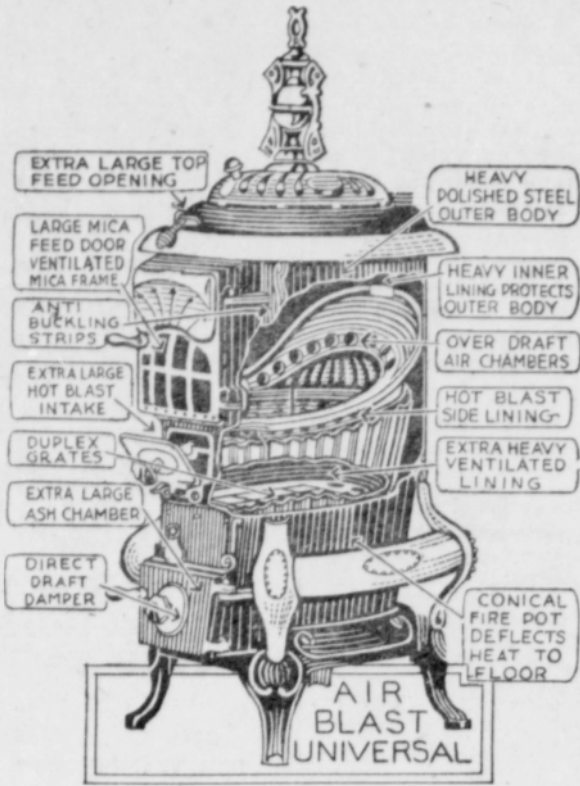

GRESHAM POSTOFFICE RECOMMENDATION MADE

According to telegrams received by both the Outlook and Miss Elisabeth Johnson from Congressman C. N. McArthur, Miss Johnson has been recommended by him to the postmaster general for the position of Gresham postmaster.

The telegram as sent by Mr. McArthur reads: "Elisabeth Johnson heads the list of civil service eligibles for Gresham postoffice and I have recommended her to the postmaster general."—C. N. McArthur.

This news will be welcomed by many friends of Miss Johnson. While it is not an appointment it is accepted as almost a certainty that on the advice of Postmaster General Hays, President Harding will appoint Miss Johnson.

Miss Johnson is a graduate of Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa, her native state, which, according to her statement, is a "grand old state to come from." After a course of study at the State University of Iowa at Iowa City, she took up the work of teaching. After three years in this work, Miss Johnson gave up teaching to assist her father, the Rev. Marion Johnson, in philanthropic work as state superintendent of the Washington Children's Home society with headquarters at Seattle, Washington. When Mr. Johnson's failing health made it necessary for him to give up public work, the family moved to Gresham where they have resided since.

For the past three years Miss Johnson has been in the government service, being employed in the department of agriculture, bureau of public roads, with offices in the post office building, Portland, (driving to and from her work in Portland practically every day during that time).

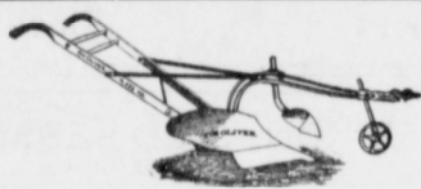
