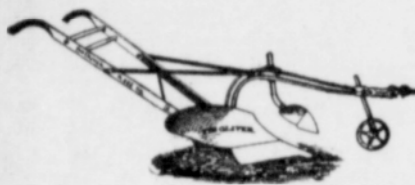

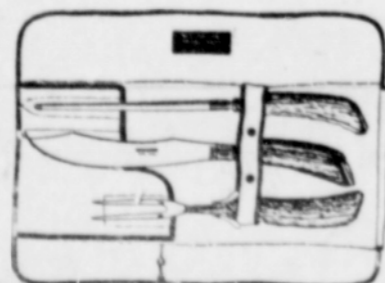

GRESHAM LOCALS

Wednesday evening a Thanksgiving service will be held at the Methodist church, to which all are cordially invited. No plan for a formal program has been arranged, but a spirit of friendship and fellowship will prevail.

MEAT BUYERS ENCOURAGE YOUNG CLUB MEMBERS

Twelve fat hogs went to market while at the stock show, but they still live in each boy's memory because there hangs at home blue and red ribbons, and fat checks are being received which signify a project carried through successfully with a neat profit in the balance.

The meat companies gave 14 cents for the individual hogs. Leslie Lynch received 14 1/4 cents for his fat pen and Alta Dahlhammar 13 cents. These prices were 5 cents above market quotations and were given to encourage the boys and girls.

In the fat pens raised for the Union Stock Yards Special, Alta Dahlhammar won first prize of \$40. Melville Richey of Clackamas second prize of \$35 and Leslie Lynch third which gave him \$25 as a prize. Alta's prizes and sales check for the year's shows make up a neat sum of \$171, and Leslie's \$154. Paul Fox, with Duke, won in the county, state and stock show, a trip to O. A. C. summer school, valued at \$25, \$18 in cash and sold his hog for \$32.19 making a total of \$75.19. Add to the cash value the training for responsibility of being held through eight months to the task of feeding, the joy of attending the fairs and comparing results with others and you will not wonder why boys and girls join the pig clubs.

Some may ask what of those who failed? All but two members made reports this fall. There were three hogs shown that did not win and several parents did not see the value of fairs so did not co-operate, but even these received the value of club meetings, tours and stock judging.

CARELESS SMOKERS CAUSE FIRE LOSS

From reports received at the District Forester's office, a total of 100 forest fires in Oregon and Washington during 1921 were due to smokers. These reports are from only 13 to 22 national forests but indicate, forest officers say, that a far greater percentage of forest fires are caused each year by cigarette and cigar stubs and matches than is generally supposed.

The Okanogan forest reports that 29 per cent of their fires were due to smokers, while 16 fires on the Crater forest which cost \$225 to put out started from smoker's cigarette stubs or unextinguished matches. The Whitman forest states that 21 fires on that forest were due to smokers. The Colville forest reports that it cost \$874 to put out 19 fires starting from smokers, while the Olympic forest had only one smoker's fire but that cost \$68 to extinguish.

Cigars and cigarettes consumed every single day in the year, if placed end to end, would reach from the Atlantic to the Pacific and back again; 80,777 cigarettes and 13,835 cigars are burned to ashes for every minute of the 24 hours. The combined total lengths of cigars and cigarettes smoked annually in the United States aggregate almost 2,275,000 miles—over six times the total mileage of the nation's railroads.

The outright damage wrought by fires attributed to tobacco and matches reached a total of more than \$91,000,000 in the five years 1915-1919, inclusive, according to report of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. During this same period forest fires burned over some sixty million acres and involved a loss of approximately \$100,000,000. A considerable per cent of these fires, state Federal forest officers, were due to "tailor-made" cigarettes carelessly thrown away in the woods.

Nearly two years ago former Secretary of Agriculture Meredith wrote to seven of the leading tobacco companies of this country asking their help in enlisting smokers in a campaign against careless use of fires in the forest. This letter, after calling attention to the serious loss caused by forest fires, suggested inert slips in cigarette and tobacco packages as an effective means of fire warning. The result was disappointing—one firm answered.

This year like cooperation in fire prevention was requested of 35 of the leading tobacco manufacturers by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. But not a single reply was received.
