

**PIONEER RESIDENT IS LAID TO FINAL REST**  
Harvey L. Waybill died at his home near Pleasant Home November 17, 1921, at the age of 86 years, 3 months and 29 days.  
Although owing to his advanced age, he had been feeble for some years he was in his usual health until the morning of the day of his death and his sudden death came as a great shock.  
He was a pioneer resident of the

Pleasant Home section, having settled there in 1865.  
Besides his widow he leaves a son S. S. Waybill of Pleasant Home and three daughters, Mrs. M. H. Wheeler, of Boring; Mrs. C. A. Wheeler, of Pleasant Home, and Mrs. J. H. Knight of Gresham.  
Funeral services were held at the Methodist church at Pleasant Home, Wednesday at 11 a. m., and interment at Douglass cemetery.

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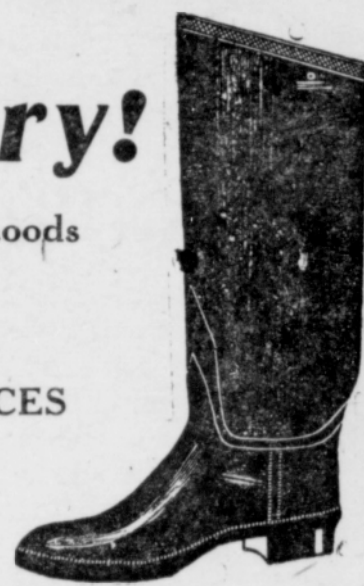
