IN THE RIGHT LIGHT.

Special meetings are now being held in the Methodist church in Gresham and from time to time are held by others of the protestant churches in the locality.

They are sometimes called revival meetings and that seems an appropriate designation. It has in the minds of some, however, a suggestion that thinking people should get away from, namely, that the church has grown cold and indifferent and needs to be revived to what should be its normal condition.

It is true such meetings are often made too spectacular and exciting and too much pressure is brought to bear on "outsiders." This is resented and accounts for some not attending at all.

A revival should be viewed in the broad sense of quickening the church in its customary lines of activity, deepening its spiritual life, increasing its efficiency and extending its influence in the community.

The church seeks to improve and increase its membership. All will acknowledge that the Christian church is one of our best institutions and as such should have the unanimous and hearty support of all who love personal and national righteousness.

There is an impression that the church is all right for the women and children. The business man often holds himself aloof from attendance or active part in its work. This is a narrow view and an unworthy attitude. The men are needed and they especially need the steady, directing, uplifting power of the church.

It may be said of the meetings now being held that they are so conducted and their spirit is so practical that they appeal strongly to the thoughtful, busy man of affairs, who wants to see the community advanced in intelligence and moral strength and feels his own personal need of a moral and spiritual quickening.

Many men are not putting the best of which they are capable into their life and work, and many are not getting the best possible out of this short life. The church helps immensely in putting these and other problems in the right light before the individual and the world.
