FARMER'S WEEK WILL HAVE DOUBLE PROGRAM

Farmer's week this coming year will be January 16 to 21 and promises to be one of the largest and best ever put on here. Beside the agricultural section which will meet as usual at the Grange hall, a splendid course in Home Economics will be given for the women at the Gresham library.

Mrs. Jessie McCombs, state home demonstration agent, is working with S. B. Hall, county agent, to line up speakers and a suitable program for this section.

This is a new feature in this county and probably is the first time in the history of the state that women and men of a farming section have had such a splendid double header program carried into their midst.

Mr. Hall announces that the programs this year will be devoted to special lines rather than to the more general problems that have been taken up in the past years.

The experts from the college will speak and discussion will follow. More time will be allowed for the discussion of these special topics this year.

Mr. Hall and other interested are busily working up the schedule for each day and a complete program will be given in later issues.

The Business Men's association has taken hold of the project and are boosting for a fine session this year and expect to make the annual banquet on Saturday, Farm Bureau day, one of the biggest and best yet given. It is expected that the attendance will reach the four figure mark this year.

Especially is the home economics department creating interest among the women of this section as it is an entirely new feature here.

AGRICULTURAL SECTION.

Soils Improvement Day.
Monday, January 16, experts will take up Soil Improvement by crop rotation in order to maintain the fertility of the soil and get natural production soil improvement by drainage.

The advantages of drainage and the operation of the state drainage law will also be discussed.

The use of the soil map which is being made of Multnomah county, will be explained.

Crops Day.
Tuesday, January 17, will be devoted largely to Potatoes, emphasis being placed on methods used for sources of better seed, advantages in selection and development of strains of seed stock and potato certification.

Small Fruits Day.
Wednesday, January 18, will be devoted largely to berry culture with special emphasis on the development of small fruits in the community. These including raspberries, loganberries, blackberries, strawberries and gooseberries.

Poultry Day.
Thursday, January 19, will be devoted largely to the major problems in poultry work which are not taken up at the poultry demonstration farms during the year. Emphasis will be placed on poultry diseases and methods of control, on the rotation necessary in poultry work and on the development and maintenance of breeding stock.

Dairy and Farm Record Work Day.
Friday, Jan. 20, dairy improvement work, improvement of dairy herds will be taken up, also a discussion of the question of keeping farm records will be taken up, also a discussion on the use of hogs for the utilization of by-products.

Farm Bureau Day.
Saturday, January 21, 1922. The forenoon program will be devoted to the Farm Bureau in the annual meeting and election of officers for the coming year.

Business men of Gresham will give their luncheon at noon with a program after lunch and plans are being made for the largest and best entertainment and banquet yet given. It is expected that there will be a thousand persons here for Farm Bureau week this year.

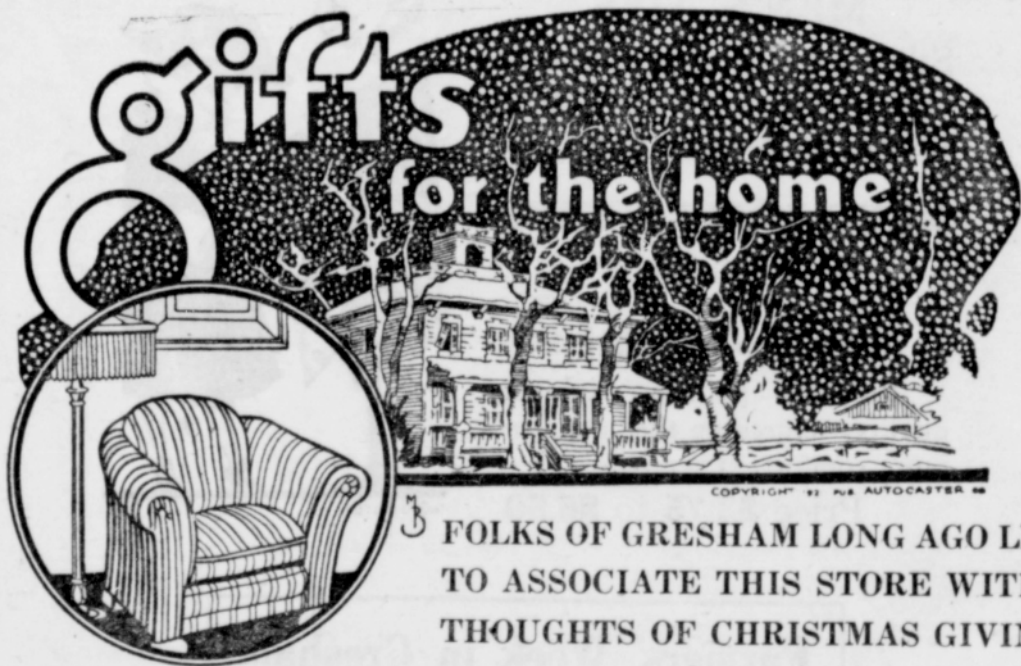
