**Baked Oyster Plant.**  
Wash and scrape oyster plant. Cook in boiling salted and acidulated water for half an hour. Drain and rub through a strainer. To three cups of salisfy puree add three tablespoons butter, one-half cup milk, one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon paprika. Beat well with a big spoon and put in a buttered baking dish. Cover with coarse bread crumbs, dot with bits of butter and bake in a moderate oven till a light brown on top. It will take about twenty minutes to bake. Serve very hot.
