"WHAT LINCOLN'S GETTYSBURG ADDRESS HAS MEANT TO THE WORLD"

Is the subject of an essay in which the students of the Seventh grade, Eighth grade, Sophomores and Freshmen, and the Juniors and Seniors are competing for prizes donated by the First State Bank, amounting in total value to \$140.

There are four separate and distinct classes for which prizes are offered, the prizes for each class being valued at \$35. It will be seen that the Seventh grade students compete only in their class and not with the Eighth grade, nor either of these grades with the students of the High schools. Likewise the high school students; the Freshmen and Sophomores compete in one class and the Juniors and Seniors in another class.

The different schools are to vote for the judges who will pass upon the essays. The contest is intended to fill students with that patriotism and enthusiasm that endowed President Lincoln at the time he made the Address. The County School Superintendent has expressed his approval and appreciation of the work, and it is hoped that every school in Eastern Multnomah and Clackamas Counties having a Seventh and Eighth Grade, and every High School, will participate in the contest.

A large number of schools have expressed their desire to compete for the prizes, but there are a number which have not been heard from, and it is feared that they have overlooked the instructions sent out to teachers, wherein it was stated that notice must be given the First State Bank on or before February 1 by all the schools desiring to participate in the contest. It has therefore been decided to extend the time in which such notice may be given to the First State Bank to and including February 10, 1922. When this has been done, numbers will be promptly furnished such schools as participate for use on their essays. The names of the students will be retained by the teachers until after the awards have been made by the judges, so that the judges will not know on whose paper they are passing. The judges who pass upon the papers are not to be connected with any school and the whole plan is thought to be as fair as can be devised.

All teachers are urged to show proper enthusiasm in their schools by having as many of their students compete for the prizes as is possible. Rules and Regulations regarding the contest are in the hands of all the teachers, and parents will do well to have the children enter the contest, for much of our best talent comes from the country schools.
