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STOPPING WASTE OF NATURAL RESOURCES.

The world is beginning to wake up to the reckless waste practiced for a half a century and more in the production and use of its natural resources. Two-thirds of every ton of coal has gone up into the air or into the dump. Enormous volumes of natural gas have been allowed to escape to the limits of an earth atmosphere. Hundreds of millions of barrels of petroleum have flowed over the ground to utter uselessness. And so all along the line.

Everywhere you hear of steps being taken to correct this wastefulness. Thus, if conservation becomes the rule hereafter with new discoveries below the surface, there will be less and less need of fear that the world will go short of coal and gasoline in the not very distant future.

Canada doesn't propose to be squeezed-out orange like some sections of the United States. During the last five years enormous coal fields and petroleum deposits have been discovered in Alberta, her north-west province, and already she is passing laws against wasteful handling of these resources.

One of Canada's scientific investigators reports that "if the coal measures of Alberta be carefully conserved and scientifically utilized, and all the gas, oil and other by-products be recovered to the best advantage, the whole world can be supplied with fuel and oil for a thousand years from the Alberta fields alone."

The future of the coal mining industry in America contains something like this: great plants at the mines when the coal at its arrival at the surface will be turned into electricity (to be carried by wire to cities and towns) and into gas, coke and its other valuable parts, all of which can be shipped in small containers and cheaper than coal in the bulk.

SEVERAL NEW BOOKS AT GRESHAM LIBRARY

Several new books have just come to the Gresham library and are now ready to be taken. They are all well known authors written on varied subjects from tales of the early pioneers to descriptions of the rich jewels worn by the women of the far east.

"Messer Marco Polo" by Donn Byrne is a love story about Marco Polo and the daughter of Kubla Khan. It tells of the rich lands owned by Kubla Khan and of strange seas and islands of the east. It is filled with descriptions of rich jewels, ivory, apes, peacocks, spices, porcelains, silks and pad-footed camel trains.

A tale of the courage and vision of the American pioneer is found in the story of "A Son of the Middle Border" by Hamlin Garland. It gives in intimate detail the life of a family on the western frontier, shortly after the time of the Civil War.

"To Him That Hath" by C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) is a novel of purpose, dealing with the problems of the worker. It presents the case for peace and goodwill, prescribing a remedy for the aching and wounded heart of the world.

Mr. Hudson's keen insight and appreciation of the little things of life are shown in "A Traveler in Little Things" by W. H. Hudson. It also shows his never failing sympathy and delicacy of feeling. A shy whimsical humor flickers pleasantly around the characters he depicts in these pages.

Dorothy Scarborough has contributed a book full of "Humorous Ghost Stories." Some of the names of these stories are "The Ghost Extinguisher," "The Mummy's Foot," "The Ghost of Miser Brimpton," and "The Ghost That Got the Button."

The "Wondering Jew" by E. Temple Thurston is a powerful representation of the old Jew, doomed to wander the earth until Judgment Day. The play, which has been enjoying a long run in London has just been presented in America. The first scene is Jerusalem on the day of the Crucifixion, the second is Syria at the time of the first Crusade, the third is Sicily in the thirteenth century and the last is Seville during the inquisition.

The last of this group "The Hill" by H. A. Vachell is a delightful tale of English school life in which is depicted a "romance of friendship."

IF YOU WANT REAL SERVICE

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Income Tax in Nutshell.

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more, or gross income of \$5,000 or more. Married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more, or gross income of \$5,000 or more.

WHEN? March 15, 1922, is final date for filing returns and making first payments.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives, or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Full directions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$4,000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surtax from one per cent to 65 per cent on net incomes over \$5,000 for the year 1921.

Income Tax Facts.

In making out his income tax return for 1921, the average taxpayer will find a considerable saving in comparison with the amount of tax paid on the same income for 1920.

The exemptions provided by the revenue act of 1921 are \$1,000 for single persons (the term including widows, divorcees, and persons separated from husband and wife by mutual agreement), \$2,500 for married persons whose net income was \$5,000 or less, and \$2,000 for married persons whose net income was \$5,000 or more. Under the revenue act of 1918 the personal exemption allowed a married person was \$2,000, regardless of the amount of net income. The personal exemption allowed a married person applies also to the head of a family, man or woman who supports in one household one or more relatives by blood, marriage, or adoption.

The exemptions for dependents—a person who receives his chief support from the taxpayer and who is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective—is increased from \$200 to \$400.

The act requires that a return be filed by every single person whose net income for 1921 was \$1,000 or more, every married person whose net income was \$2,000 or more, and by every person—single or married—whose gross income was \$5,000 or more.

The requirement to file a return of gross income of \$5,000 or more regardless of net income is a new provision. Net income is gross income less certain specified deductions for business expenses, losses, bad debts, etc., which are fully explained on the forms.

Returns must be filed by married couples whose combined net income for 1921, including that of dependent minor children, equaled or exceeded \$2,000, or if the combined gross income equaled or exceeded \$5,000.

The period for filing returns is from January 1 to March 15, 1922. Heavy penalties are provided for failure or "willful refusal" to file a return on time.

Forms 1040A for incomes of \$5,000 and less and 1040 for incomes in excess of \$5,000 may be obtained from the offices of collectors of internal revenue and branch offices. The tax may be paid in full at the time of filing the return, or in four equal installments, due on or before March 15, June 15, September 15, and December 15.
