MAKING NEW CITIZENS.

Schools to Have Essay Contest.

The following schools are participating in an essay contest, the subject of which is, "What Lincoln's Gettysburg Address Has Meant to the World."

Union High school No. 1, Union High school No. 2, Gresham public school, Fairview, Rockwood, Gilbert, Victory, Terry, Springdale, Warrendale, Orient, and Hillsview and Boring are all in Multnomah county.

Those in Clackamas county are Boring, Sandy, Kelso, Cottrell, Bull Run, Union and Damascus.

A total of 148 boys and 194 girls are planning to take part in the contest. This makes a grand total of 342 pupils.

The above schools have elected as judges of the contest, Rev. A. S. Hisey, Hon. Geo. W. Stapleton and Mrs. J. M. C. Miller, of Sandy, Oregon. Judges of essays prepared by high schools students will be Rev. E. B. Cotton, Hon. Geo. W. Stapleton, and Wm. Morand of Boring, Oregon, as judges of essays prepared by grade school students.

MORE INCOME TAX REMINDERS

Taxpayers are reminded that income tax returns for the year 1921 must reach the office of Clyde G. Huntley, Collector of Internal Revenue, not later than midnight March 15 in order to escape severe penalties.

This does not mean that it will be sufficient for the taxpayer to mail his return on March 15. The return must be mailed at a time that will insure its delivery in the office of the collector at Portland not later than midnight, March 15.

On account of the numerous inquiries received at his office, Collector Huntley is of the opinion that many taxpayers do not know that the stamp taxes on legal instruments were not repealed by the new Revenue Act.

SENATOR CHAS. HALL SEEKS NOMINATION AS GOVERNOR

Senator Charles Hall, of Marshfield, formerly of Hood River, has sent to the republican press of the state an announcement of his candidacy for republican nomination for the office of Governor of Oregon.

He was born in Pennsylvania and a little over 20 years ago, as a young man, came to Oregon and went into business at Clatskanie. He was engaged in the drug business and later bought a drug store in Hood River where he lived until 1914 when he moved to Coos Bay.

1920 he was elected senator from the eighth senatorial district comprising Coos and Curry counties.

Senator Hall soon became one of the leaders in state-wide politics as a fearless exponent of the highway program. As a legislator he played a prominent part in all important legislation during both sessions in 1921. He risked censure from the exponents of the 1925 Exposition Bill when he refused to listen to any

proposed inroads into the road funds for the purpose of financing the fair. Hall's undeviating course in this latter action brought forth the highest praise from all parts of the state.

Since his debut into state-wide politics, the leadership in various non-political movements has gravitated naturally to him. He is a member of the Oregon Land Settlement Commission and served for three years as president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce and is now director of that organization.

Friends of Senator Hall proclaim him as a natural leader, and point with pride to his record of achievements in public and private life. Others concede that his judgment is sound and admit that no outside pressure or log-rolling can swerve him from any program, or movement to which he has dedicated himself.

Mr. Hall was married in 1906 in Portland to Ann English. They have three children, two boys thirteen and seven, one girl nine.

Senator Hall in his announcement sets forth briefly some of the leading principles for which he stands, as follows:

- 1. I have made no pre-election promises and I will make none, except those herein stated.
2. Taxes on general property must be reduced. I favor substituting not to exceed ten departments for the seventy or more existing state commissions. (Illinois System.)
3. Not only reduction of taxes, but improved marketing facilities and increased credit are essential to insure the prosperity of the farmer.
4. A more equitable adjustment of the automobile license tax with due regard to the actual value of the car. Gasoline tax for highways only.
5. As to my attitude on the labor question, I refer to my employes, and my legislative record.
6. Completion of the State Highway System with special attention to market roads.
7. The public school is one of the fundamental factors in our system of government. I favor compulsory attendance in the primary grades. Teach pure Americanism to all pupils, beginning at an early age. Continue to strengthen and build up this typical American institution.
8. Strict enforcement of all laws.
9. I am against Japanese land ownership or control.

not think of raising runt pigs and expect to make a success of hog raising. The same thing applies to berry raising. I have 50,000 plants which I tipped under ideal conditions last fall and the root system on each plant now is as large as the hand. These plants are from very thrifty young plants.

I am looking forward with great pleasure to the record that a certain 20-acre field will make that I am going to set out with part of these plants during the first part of April of this year.

In planting a variety of berries, the picking season is lengthened. The yard that has a balanced variety so that about the same number of pickers is needed through the season will have a decided edge on the yard with only one variety when competition for pickers becomes keen.

Another general rule to follow in the planting of berries is to consult your trade as to what will be wanted. I sell to a cannery and therefore I consult with the cannery people as to what they want. It is a rule that, everything else being equal, the cannery with a variety of kinds of fruit in strong demand can force the buyer to place his whole order with this cannery. The cannery can thus clean up on the lower grade goods.

I am not advising anyone to plant loganberries. I am merely giving my reasons for doing as I am in planting them along with the Cuthberts and blackberries.
