## ATTEMPT MADE TO ROB MONTAVILLA BANK

Robbers attempted to burn their way into the vault of the Montavilla Savings bank Wednesday evening but evidently were frightened away before they had a chance to complete the work.

The first person to find out that the yeggs had broken into the bank was William Berg, vice president of the bank. He opened the door a little before eight o'clock Thursday and noticed that something was wrong on account of the tools lying about. Around the vault in which thousands of dollars were stored, was a litter of burglar tools and on the lower left hand corner of the vault door a jagged hole was found where the cracksmen had bored through the metal with a blow-torch. The safe was still warm when it was discovered. The hole in the safe was about a foot square and must have taken about 2 or 3 hours to burn. The yeggs had reached the inside door and in a few minutes more would have allowed them to reach the interior vault.

A hurried call was sent to the police. They came and searched the ground around the building before coming inside.
