COLONIAL PARTY BRINGS LARGE CROWD TO ORIENT

A most delightful affair was the Colonial party Wednesday evening at Orient Grange hall by the Community Council of the Lusted, Orient, Victory and Cottrell school districts. There were nearly 300 persons present for the program which was given during the early part of the evening. Numbers were furnished by the various schools in the Council. Variety of entertainment was afforded and everyone enjoyed the songs, duets and costume dialogue to the limit. The character play and drill by the children were especially clever and pretty.

The grip, influenza and whooping cough kept most of the pupils of Cottrell and Victory schools from attending as these districts have been especially hard hit by the prevailing epidemic.

The Rev. Earl B. Cotton, president of the Community Council, welcomed the large audience and explained the purpose of the gathering in a few well chosen remarks.

The program went off as announced and was followed by a short patriotic address by the Rev. D. Q. Barry, pastor of the Pleasant Home Baptist church. Mr. Barry's address was short and to the point and filled with interesting stories and illustrations.

At the conclusion of the program the evening was spent in visiting and in enjoying the delicious refreshments that were provided in abundance. The young people gathered in a circle and played games until the signal for "lights out" was given at midnight.

As originally planned this entertainment was to have been merely a social event, but because of the call for funds from the community for the W. C. T. U. farm home for boys and girls near Corvallis, the plan was altered and the committee in charge of raising the funds was allowed to charge an admission of 25c each for every one above the grade school age and this fund will be contributed to the support and equipment of the farm home. Mrs. M. Lennartz and Mrs. B. C. Altman, who were the local committee in charge of raising the community quota, express their appreciations for the kindly cooperation of the Community Council in allowing them this privilege. The sum of \$31 was realized which will be forwarded at once to the W. C. T. U. committee in charge of the plans for this much needed home.
