Your "Peak Load."

The brick mason works about 200 days of the year, but his family eats 365 days. The stationary fireman draws pay for every working day in the year. The farmer and the school teacher are profitably employed a bare eight months of the year but living expenses continue for the other four months. Idle horses, machinery and farm land investment must be ready for the farmers "peak load" which comes at harvest time. The "peak load" for the gas company comes for an hour at each meal time, but the investment in equipment and man power must be maintained for the other 21 hours. The "peak load" for the electric light company comes in the early evening, when in three hours more current is often demanded than during the remaining 21 hours of the day, but the plant must be ready to serve when the public demands, Sundays included, regardless of the capital investment that remains while the equipment is loafing. Street car service is exacted "in chunks" but the transportation company must furnish it because it is a public service corporation, with an eye single to the needs of the community and the demands of patrons. Brick laying and telephone service cannot be done at odd spells against a busy season; street car travel does not yield to cold storage. The "peak load" is the great problem of every utility manager. If the demand were comparatively constant for gas, electric, telephone or carrying service throughout the year, rates could be reduced tremendously to the mutual satisfaction and profit of operators and customers.—The Manufacturer.

WORK OF CLUB BOYS INTERESTS PORTLAND MEN

A more complete report on the demonstrations given by the club boys of this district at the Commercial club in Portland Monday was received today.

There were 500 business men present at the club luncheon when the boys presented their work. During the first part of the program, the audience was only partially interested; but when the potato club took the stand they gave their undivided attention.

O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition of Portland was present at the luncheon. He seated himself with the club boys and Miss Ethel Calkins county club leader. When asked by the committee in charge to take his seat on the platform with them, Mr. Plummer refused. The committee informed him that it was his duty to sit with them to give his support but Mr. Plummer still refused saying that he preferred to stay with the boys.

At the completion of the program, the committee, who had refused to have the girls demonstrate their work, asked to have it put on in three weeks.

Lloyd Bramhall gave a report on the potato club work during the last three years. When he compared potato club yields to the yields secured throughout the state, he received an applause from the audience. The club boys' average yield was 285 tons to the acre as compared with 100 tons which was the average yield to the acre among the farmers of the state.

Young Bramhall gave the potato club program which is as follows: Hill selecting of seed. Proper cutting. Treatment of diseases. Four or more year periods of crop rotation.

Rogueing out diseased plants. after which he said, "This is why we beat the older folks." All through his talk he added spicy remarks that took with the business men. He was so filled with enthusiasm and presented his subject so well that the business men wanted to shake hands with him after it was over.

This work was not entirely new to some of the men present as in the group of 500 business men were there were some who have donated \$25 at various times to cover the expenses of trips of boys and girls to the Oregon Agricultural College to summer school.

The growing interest which the men are showing will lend more support to club work throughout the state. The funds are not sufficient at present and many times the county leaders have to pay their own expenses on their own cars in order to cover their territory and aid the boys in their undertakings.

STATE CLUB LEADER VISITS GRESHAM

Outlines Year's Work and Organizes New Clubs.

L. J. Allen, state livestock club leader, arrived in Gresham this morning. He will meet with the local livestock leaders at Orient this afternoon. One of the purposes of the meeting is to plan the year's work for the pig and calf clubs. Mr. Allen will instruct the leaders in the work to be accomplished by the club boys this year. He will also take up the subject of exhibiting at the fair this fall.

The leaders expected to be present are: C. P. Tallman, A. H. Burns, J. Flemming, Mrs. A. O. Stafford, G. Nasshahn, Mrs. Louise Nelson, Wm. Newlands and A. Killen. Mr. Allen will hold a meeting at the Gresham library tomorrow morning (Saturday March 4) and assisted by Miss Ethel Calkins will organize several new calf and pig clubs.

The leaders of the various clubs appreciate the cooperation of the parents. The work was a little discouraging to the leaders at first because of the lack of interest shown by the parents. This made it very hard to keep the boys interested in club

work. Now, however, the parents realize the useful training the boys are receiving and are cooperating with the leaders in the work. The result of this cooperation is that the leaders are saved a good deal of work and they now have time to plan larger and more complete programs for the boys.

Income Tax Facts.

The new requirement of the income tax law that returns shall be made of gross income of \$5,000 or more regardless of the amount of net income upon which the tax is assessed, necessitates careful computation on the part of the taxpayer. "Gross income" includes practically every dollar received by the taxpayer during the year 1921 in salaries, wages, commissions, rents, royalties, interest on bank deposits, cash dividends on stock, "or income from any source whatsoever." "Net income" is gross income less certain deductions provided for by the act, including all business expenses incurred in the conduct of a business, trade, profession, or vocation.

Certain expenditures, however, are not deductible as a business expense when made for the purchase of articles more or less permanent in character, or for permanent improvement of property. For example, a merchant would not be allowed to deduct the amount expended in the erection of a new store, or a farmer the cost of a new tractor or threshing machine, since such investments are held to be capital investments. The law expressly prohibits the deduction of family or living expenses, such as rent for a dwelling, repairs to a dwelling, cost of food and clothing for the family, education of children, servant's wages, and similar items. Amounts spent during the year 1921 for any of these items are not deductible.
