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NEW REALM OPENED BY WIRELESS.

Every time some new great world-transforming discovery is made, and human ingenuity and invention applied to its development for practical use—like the telephone, the telegraph, the automobile—the people in general settle down to the thought, This is about as far as we can go in this direction. A few, however, may have conceptions away beyond apparent present possibilities. They usually work away quietly in the face of public opposition.

It was so with the telegraph which is less than 100 years old. The first line, 13 miles long, was in operation in England in 1835. The first Morse line in this country was between Washington and Baltimore in 1842. The first Atlantic cable was laid in 1866.

It was so with the telephone which was invented by Alexander Graham Bell in 1875 and exhibited at the centennial exposition in 1876. It was at that time regarded as a toy, a curious contraption.

The automobile is the development of the past 25 or 30 years. Whoever dreamed 25 years ago that by the year 1922 there would be nearly ten million automobiles and trucks in use in the United States?

Now comes the wireless telephone, the product of the past few years, springing almost over night into a place of incalculable human service, leaping into usefulness beyond the place of the telephone and the telegraph. Not that it can for some time at least take the place commercially of the latter two utilities, though it may in the future.

Though the cast of radiotelephony seems at present high, a way will be found to develop it into a commercial utility like the telegraph and telephone companies at present. Undoubtedly the range of usefulness of the wireless will greatly surpass the wire systems.

Wireless is capable of doing wonders even during the next few years. Already all the great commercial centers have sending stations capable of broadcasting over a distance of from 500 to 1000 miles or more and receiving sets are being installed in homes or business places or halls by the thousands. Even the sailor at sea, the woodsman, miles from home, and the autoist on his journey, by having the proper equipment, may hear real operas sung, phonograph records played, lectures given, and the latest news read.

When this old world brings to relative perfection all the great and glorious inventions and improvements it now has under way won't it be a sweet old world to live in? But most of us will be about ready then to pass on and the next generation will be as dissatisfied with what it has as the present one.

HORSE THIEVING HAS SLUMPED.

Horse thefts on the Pacific Coast are on the decline. The assertion is based on the fact that recently the National Horse Thief Detective association asked the railroads for rates to their annual convention to be held

in Logansport, Indiana, October 4 and 5, and that to date he has been unable to find a single delegate in the western states.

Peck says that the automobile has supplanted the horse on the Pacific Coast to such an extent that horse thieves are about as rare as dodo birds, and horse thief detectives or those gentry whose vocation it is to apprehend equine purloiners "just ain't."

But it would be different if the automobile thief detective agencies were to meet.

Farmers Warned of Fake Tree Spray.

Dusting for orchard diseases and pest control has not given as good results as spraying, and until improvements are made in both materials and machinery Oregon orchardists are advised to stick to the old liquid spray outfits. The right liquid sprays, if well applied, cannot be beat as yet.

Brick dust, baking soda, and sulfur are the "magic" ingredients of the "Thompson Tree Powder," an advertised cure-all for every orchard pest or disease. A careful chemical analysis made in the Oregon Experiment station laboratories shows that this powder is composed of flowers of sulfur 54.3 per cent, sodium bicarbonate (baking soda) 9.1 per cent, and brick dust 36.6 per cent. This is the material that was supposed to rid a tree of every ill when inserted in a hole bored in the tree's trunk. Testimonials were obtained for this concoction by the agents of it and some orchardists have paid a fancy price for the fake cure in spite of the warning sent out by the experiment station.

Tons of another fake tree powder known as "Squassa" have been peddled to growers in southern Oregon this winter. Samples of it submitted for analysis prove to be made up of 93 per cent flowers of sulfur with 7 per cent impurities. Agents for it claim magic results from scattering it around the roots of the trees infected, explaining that all tree maladies are a matter of nourishment which this great discovery will correct.

"Such fakes as these are not only worthless and expensive but cast reflection on honest manufacturers who are putting out excellent material for the control of orchard pests," said a member of the experiment station staff. "It is the cure-all that growers should regard with suspicion as these are invariably put out for one purpose only—to get the farmer's money before the agents are exposed by the experiment stations. All reputable concerns submit their products to the experiment stations before marketing them, as they are interested in putting out the best produce possible.

The best way to prevent tomatoes from blighting is to start the plants early. Transplant to pots or tins so as to produce long, leggy plants, and set in the field as early as possible on land that has been trenched from 15 to 18 inches deep. Before planting the tomatoes the trench should be filled from one-fourth to one-third full of well rotted manure and covered with earth. The plants should be set in a horizontal position with four or five inches of the top above ground. The whole stem will soon become a mass of feeding roots and force early heavy fruitage. Where manure is used in the trench the plants must be given plenty of irrigation during the hot part of the season.
