Government Railways and Taxes.
The government of Canada is in serious danger of having its credit destroyed by its railroad policy.

The railways owned by the Dominion of Canada failed in 1921 by about \$20,000,000 to earn enough to pay their operating expenses.

To this must be added about \$100,000,000 for interest on the investment which was not earned.

Therefore, directly and indirectly, government ownership of the railways last year added to the burdens of the Canadian taxpayer around \$120,000,000.

The deficit officially admitted by the Canadian government for 1920 was over \$70,000,000 but this did not include interest on a large part of the railways. J. L. Payne, former controller of statistics of department of railways and canals, estimated the total losses, direct and indirect, in 1920 at about \$136,000,000.

The railway deficit of Canada is becoming an extremely serious thing. Canada has only nine million people and the Dominion government has an annual revenue of only about \$450,000,000.

Government railway deficits were incurred by the railways of the United States in 1918 and 1919 under government operation.

Since the government guarantees to the railroads of the United States were withdrawn they have incurred losses, but the taxpayers have not had to pay them.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS LEARN ROSE BUDDING

The following is an account of projects carried by two senior boys in the Smith-Hughes department at Gresham high school. It is noteworthy because of the work and study accomplished, and because of the financial gain.

The project consists of budding roses; securing new plants, with a study of the same.

The work was done for the Mountain View Floral Co., of Portland, Oregon, under the supervision of Mr. Griesel, a florist. The study was done under the supervision of Mr. Averill, instructor in the Smith-Hughes department.

Budding started the latter part of July. The boys worked for several days as apprentices, without pay, but were put on the pay roll for four days in July and budded through until the 12th of September, making an average of about 850 buds per day for the whole season. Their wages averaged \$4 per day with 41 days work, giving \$164 for budding.

After the budding season closed the strings had to be cut. The boys worked at this for seven days at \$3.50 per day, making \$24.50 in all. In addition to this the floral company needed native wild rose plants to bud certain roses on, so the boys took the contract to deliver these. This branch of the work took eight Saturdays and holidays, with the result of 1,520 small plants at 3 1/2 cents each and 13 large plants at 10 cents each, making \$27.85 each for the eight days' work, and a total of \$215.85 profit for the project.

In addition to the money earned the boys have applied themselves to the study of plant growth which makes possible the budding principle. They are writing a thesis covering the principal points under the three main headings: (1) Systems of Growth, (2) Classification of Families, (3) Methods of Propagation.

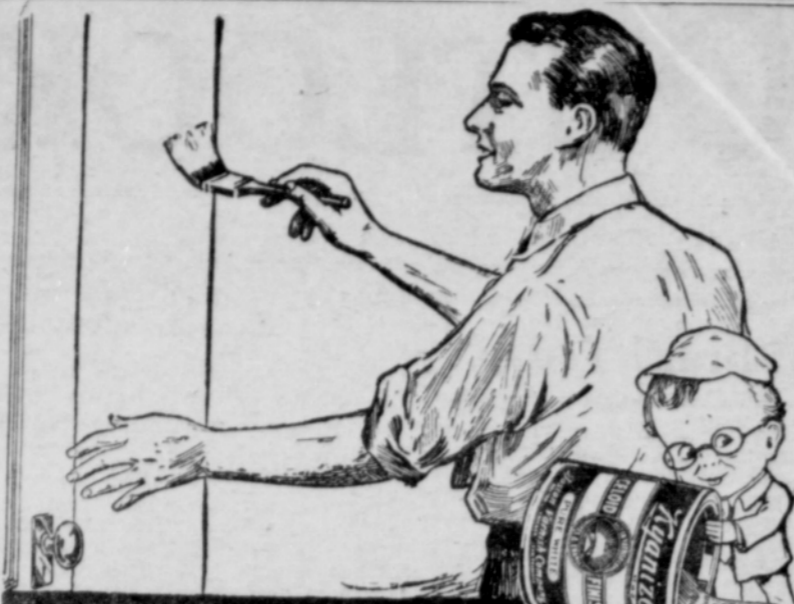
The value of this project from an educational point of view is the linking of knowledge with the art of doing. Next summer these boys are planning on devoting their time with the same floral company and at the same work, but instead of budding because the boss says to do it this way, they are going to bud according to the principles of plant growth, which they understand makes it possible to propagate plants by putting the right layers of growth together and holding them there until they have become firmly attached.

The boys carrying this project are Newell Fancher and James Fleming, of Gresham.—The News-Item.

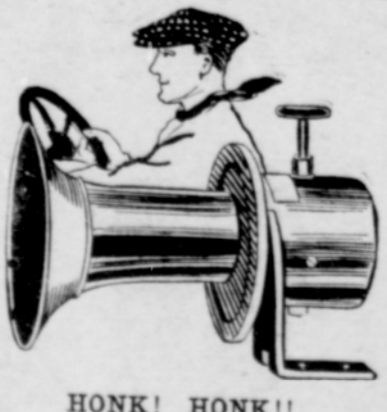
