**NIGHT SCHOOL FOR TWO MORE WEEKS**

The night school at Haley will continue for two more weeks. The work is being carried on by Wm. S. Averill of Union high school in Gresham. He is giving a series of lectures on poultry raising. Last Wednesday evening his topic was "Feeding." Next Wednesday, April 12, he will discuss "Culling," and a week from that night, April 19, he will deal with "Diseases."  
The country surrounding Haley is mostly devoted to poultry raising and much interest is being shown in the night sessions. Mr. Averill has been quite well pleased with the number of persons who have attended, and also with the interest each has shown. While the number of attendance has not been so large as at first, those present asked a number of questions and in this way showed their interest.

The Haley district is in Clackamas county but it is cut off from the rest of the county by a line of hills. For this reason, the people are not getting the benefit of the extension service as it is given by the Agricultural college. The demonstration put on by the specialists have been on farms remote from Haley and for this reason not many if any had the opportunity of attending them.

**UNION HOME**

This is the second week in April, and no oats or potatoes planted, not even the land ready, because of so much rain. The foothills are still covered with snow, which indicates cold weather for some time yet, and if it finally does turn warm, floods are practically certain. In out Union Home country most of the winter wheat stood the unusually severe winter quite well, and even winter oats in some cases need not be reseeded. This locality seems more fortunate than many others in escaping severe crop damage.

The last Farm Bureau meeting was the most successful session we had so far. Why? Well, simply because a capable committee was in charge of arrangements. Mr. Anderson, Mrs. Oran Lingle and Steve Roberts got busy, and secured Mr. Brewster of the Kerr-Gifford company, an ex-professor on poultry from O. A. C., to give an address on chick-feeding. Mr. Brewster does not advise feeding little chicks on boiled eggs, but prefers a scratch-food as soon as they will take it, and not in an open hopper either but in several inches of fine straw. The youngsters will dig right after it, and the harder they must work for it the healthier they will be. Mr. Brewster does not like a dry mash for chicks, much less a wet one. Then the committee secured our county agent, Walter Holt, who gave us valuable and timely information on seed potatoes. Through his efforts, at least half a dozen growers have expressed a desire to apply for potato certification. At least that number have dipped their seed stock in corrosive sublimate, so prospects are encouraging. Last but not least, a goodly lunch of buns, pickles, cheese, and coffee awaited us, and everybody went home, saying: If that is what the farm bureau is doing, then we'll want more of it. About 60 were present. The next meeting will be on the first Saturday evening of next month, May 6. Mrs. Herman Johnson, Mrs. Perkins and Walter Ramser are the program committee.

Men are cutting wood on the right-of-way for the new road through the Maybee timber. Work of clearing will start soon.
