REFINEMENTS ADDED TO FORD ENCLOSED CARS

BODY OF BOY FOUND IN JOHNSON CREEK

The body of 7-year-old Robert Winslow was found in Johnson creek Thursday evening by a neighbor. The child had been missing from the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Ora Flemming, since last Sunday.

The child was last seen at noon Sunday lying on the bank of the creek where the water was not very deep. They dragged the creek and searched the woods in the vicinity of the Dearford road and Gilbert station with the assistance of boy scouts. The mother, Mrs. Winslow Reed, who has been working in the Bremerton navy yard, came to Portland and told the sheriff's office that she would give a reward of \$50 to anyone leading to the discovery of the whereabouts of the missing boy.

The pins are furnished by the government, to be given out to club leaders who have a 100 per cent club. Such a club is one whose members have all completed the project, undertaken during the year, in a creditable way. The list of leaders to be awarded pins contains 27 names but, as each pin is to be given personally by Miss Calkins, they can not be given out very fast. A number of other pins will be given out soon.

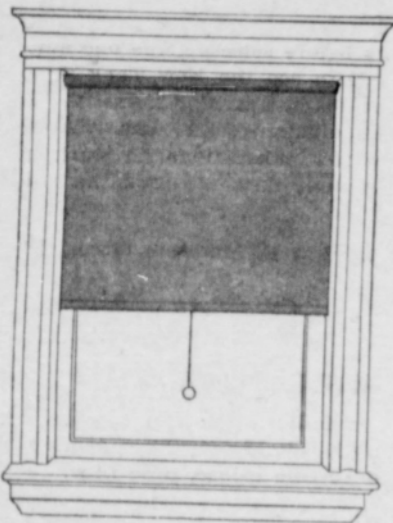
