Mr. Starkweather is of pioneer parentage his father having served in the territorial legislature. Harvey is the youngest of three sons, being 53 years old, and is a resident of Clackamas county. He has been prominent in educational and civic activities for many years.

He was a member of the commission which drafted the original Workmen's Compensation Act. Was also appointed upon the recommendation of the Oregon State Grange, as a member of the U. S. Rural Credits commission which visited several European countries and investigated that subject. The report of this commission, Senate Document No. 214, of the year 1913, was the basis for the Federal Loan Act.

For several years past, Mr. Stark-

weather has been the member of the Democratic State Central Committee for Clackamas County. For two years he was the chairman of the Democratic County Committee. In 1918 he was chosen chairman of the State Central Committee, which position he resigned in 1920 in order to enter the primary race for the United States Senate. In this race he received over eleven thousand votes.

At the present time he is president of the Jackson Club, the largest democratic organization in the State, where his administration is characterized by vigor and enthusiasm.

At a meeting of the farmers of Clackamas county held during the war, Mr. Starkweather was elected chairman of an organization to cooperate with the county agricultural agent to increase the farm production of the county.

Although born and raised and having lived on a farm practically all his life, his business activities are by no means confined to farming. He has extensive property interests throughout the State, and maintains an office in the Broadway building in Portland, in which property he is interested.

As president of the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers, Mr. Starkweather has actively promoted the interests of that organization, especially in securing a place in the public school curriculum for the teaching of Oregon history.
