Harold A. Readen of Gresham, is to be graduated from Oregon Agricultural College after four years of scholastic and student activity which is paralleled by none.

The first requisite for participation in activities not mentioned in the curriculum is a high standard of scholarship. Readen after satisfying the academic authorities on this point has been elected to the Alpha Kappa Psi, a national commercial fraternity, forensic manager, varsity debate, assistant editor Beaver Annual and The Forum, the highest student honor society on the campus. Readen has also served on the board of control, the vigilance committee, and as vice president and at present the retiring president of the student assembly. His house fraternity is Lambda Chi Alpha, a national men's fraternity, and recently he was made a member of Sigma Delta Chi, a journalistic fraternity of nation-wide prominence.

Readen is majoring in commerce and has established an average of more than 90 per cent aside from his outside activities. He has been awarded the A. J. Johnson prize for distinguished achievements. He will spend part of his vacation in Gresham before entering business in Portland.
