The fact that twelve of the nominees for state representative elected on the republican ticket at the recent primary were persons endorsed by the federated patriotic societies (the orange ticket) affords food for thought. The list included one woman and she was among the successful ones.

THIRTY-FOUR YEARS AGO.

school children in remote districts our of reach of a physician. I have found them most satisfactory because the mothers can read exactly how and where the treatment is to be applied and the length of time continued, and consequently the children are back in school within a shorter period of time.

While speaking of skin diseases, I would like to tell you about our epidemic in Bridal Veil. One of the teachers reported to the nurse that a number of the children were having some kind of skin disease and wished her to visit the school. She went out the following day, made a thorough examination of all the children and found several cases of scalp ringworm, one or two of impetigo and several more with an eruption differing from any she had ever seen before. A thorough investigation disclosed the fact that a great many of the men and women of the community were afflicted with the same eruption. Closer questioning also revealed the fact that there were two cats in the community minus patches of fur. Whatever the skin epidemic was, it was a community affair, not confined to the school children alone and needed immediate attention before it spread further. Upon my return to Portland late that afternoon, I phoned our skin specialist, explained the situation to him and the next morning we started out in a blinding blizzard on another trip to Bridal Veil. Creeping and winding along the highway in the wind and snow, being able to see only a few feet ahead of us, at intervals, the cement curb of the highway at times being utterly obliterated, we eventually reached our little lumber camp community. The doctor's diagnosis of the skin disease was "cat ringworm" and those two unfortunate cats, not content to suffer alone, had passed the affliction on to the entire community. Twenty-four ounces of ointment and a quantity of germicidal soap was sent out at once and dispensed to the entire community through the one store of the camp and the epidemic was checked in a short time.

BERRIES SAID TO BE INJURED BY WINTER

In his recent inspection of the berry fields in Gresham vicinity, S. B. Hall reports considerable damage done to the berry fields during the hard winter just over. This applies particularly to the raspberry fields. When the raspberry canes first began to leaf out no indication could be discovered that they were hurt but now that the new growth is continuing to grow, many of the canes are dying.

Just what part of the winter was responsible for the damage is unknown. Some localities swept by the cold east wind were not damaged as badly as other parts where the wind was not felt so severely.

The early killing frost which occurred just as the strawberries were beginning to blossom caused much damage and may delay the early strawberries. The next blossoms to arrive were not harmed and are growing very fast during the warm days.

The strawberry weevil is doing much damage in this locality. Many patches only in their second year are being entirely destroyed. The only means of combating this enemy is by clean cultivation to prevent its arrival. Too much emphasis cannot be put on clean cultivation. It must be remembered that the weevil thrives just as well on weeds as on the strawberry plants.
