ESSAY PRIZE WON BY CORBETT GIRL

A Corbett girl won first prize in Class 2 of First State Bank essay contest. The topic written on was "What Lincoln's Gettysburg Address Has Meant to the World." Class two was to include all sophomore and freshmen high school students and the essays were to contain not less than 500 nor more than 750 words.

"What Lincoln's Gettysburg Address Has Meant to the World."

By AGATHA HARDING. Abraham Lincoln's address, which he delivered at Gettysburg is one of the best and noblest speeches that has ever been made. It has never been surpassed by any orator of ancient, medieval, or modern times and, since it is so well known, there is no further need of an explanation.

In the history of our country this noted address has played a very important part and men during Lincoln's time said that he was destined to wide fame. Ralph Waldo Emerson said that many of the passages of his speech were sometime to become famous and that he could never easily be surpassed.

In his address Lincoln stated, "Our fathers brought forth a new nation, which was conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal."

It is very true that the Pilgrim Fathers were the first to establish a free country to all people. As the years passed our great men did all that they could to free their country from the 'tyrant yoke' of England, and to establish a better government.

During the time of the Civil War, which was caused by the slavery question, the people of the north thought that the negroes should have the same rights of freedom as the white people, while the confederates stood for slavery. It was the idea of equality between the two races that Lincoln, as the president strove to carry out, and his policy on the question of slavery was well shown in his famous debates.

These few facts show how the people from 1620 to 1865 strove to show and to prove that all men are created equal.

Out of those Memorial exercises at Gettysburg has grown our Decoration Day, which is not only to pay due honor to our dead heroes, but it is for us, the present generation, to be dedicated to the great work that remains before us. The exercises of this day have helped to keep alive the spirit of patriotism, and the decorating of the graves of the confederates, as well as those of the union soldiers, has tended to draw the North and South into a closer union. On this day politics are forgotten, and each and every one works together for the good of all.

Just as the many unknown soldiers were buried at Gettysburg at the time of the dedication, our "Unknown Soldier", who gave his life "that this nation might live", was buried in Arlington cemetery. This soldier did his share when he gave his life, and the least that we can do is to help in all undertakings and to help solve the great problems of today. Although we can never help these dead we can help our neighbor, and show him how to better his conditions and to help others. Our people can never hope to gain or win anything unless they all work together.

The fact, that there were only a few countries that believed in a government by the people, while there were many that believed in kings and despotic rulers, was clearly shown during the late war of 1914-18, when the Kaiser thought that he had been given the supreme power to rule the world. He began by invading Belgium and France, but it is as Lincoln said, "No one person has the right to rule over others, since we are all equal."

England and the United States quickly saw this point and went to the assistance of the distressed countries. They put their men on the battlefields solely for the purpose of helping the other countries and not to gain any territory or indemnities.

In the same cause which those soldiers at Gettysburg gave their lives, thousands of our men gave their lives during the "Great War." We all know that that cause was for democracy, and that "those dead did not die in vain", for, when the time came, our men were ready and stood at the front to fight for the freedom of another country. They also "gave their last full measure of devotion", for they were willing to die for their country and for their flag. They were determined that their government and our "government of the people, by the people, for the people should not perish from the earth," that this principle of a representative government should grow, that all people should govern themselves, and, as a body, make their own laws.
