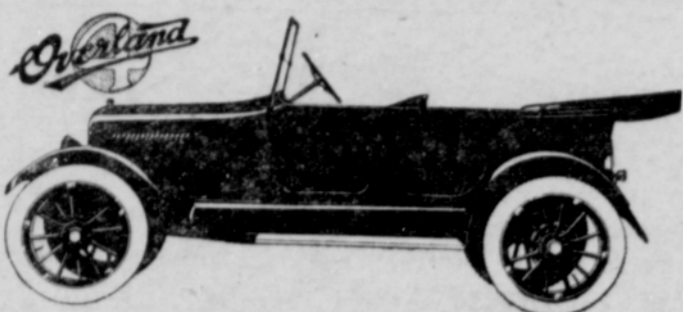
M. W. Whetzell has recently purchased the farm owned by Mr. Butz lying on the Section Line road across from the Henry Weiss farm.

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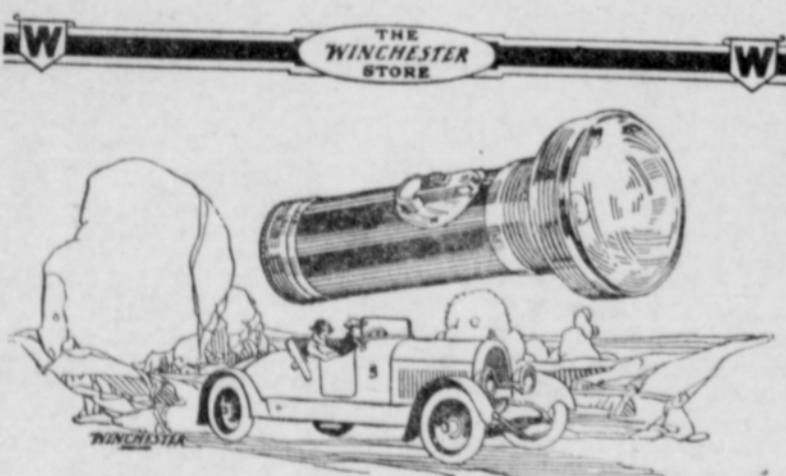
