BUSINESS CONDITIONS SAID TO BE IMPROVING

Resumption of activities of Oregon's basic industries, timber particularly; the prospects of good crops and the already realized increase in prices of wool, were the main contributors to the increased flow of business that marked the last month.

Drugs and luxuries are finding the market better as compared with the last few months. The revival in business has been marked. For April and up to May 15 the volume of business is ahead of last month and is also ahead of last year.

Wholesale grocers are enjoying their seasonal flood of business. Western Washington and western Oregon—in fact, all sections where there are diversified sources of income, report good business.

Lumber, which still maintains itself as our greatest industry, is exceptionally well situated at present. There has been a considerable increase in east bound car shipments.

Oregon lumber mills are running closer to capacity now than they have at any time since 1920. Practically all of them are operating, with the exception of the smaller interior mills.

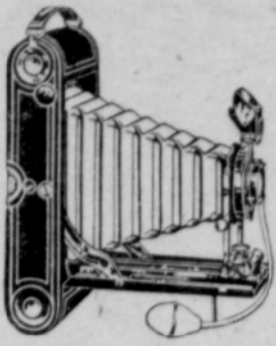
The labor situation is much improved. The building trades and allied crafts are operating at full force.

There is a very marked increase in retail business in the larger centers, particularly Portland. As compared to last month, the percentage of increase in retail volume ranged from 5 to 7 1/2 per cent.
