

**Thistles Make Silage.**

Bad patches of Canada thistles in grain may be cut out when the grain is in the milk of early dough stage and made into good silage. If then the patch is plowed up and kept cultivated off below the ground all summer the patch will be greatly weakened or killed out. Fall seed-

ing of vetch and oats on these patches will help further in smothering out the stragglers that survive.

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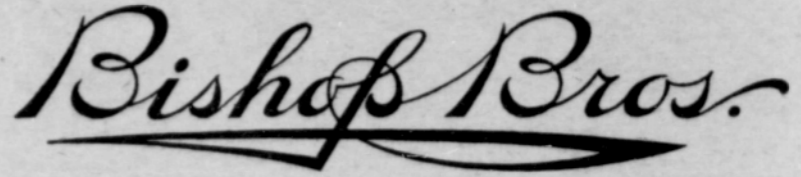
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
