HAYS CRUSADE DUE TO BEGIN.

Will H. Hays as director-general of the motion picture industry is beginning to show his hand in the elimination of indecent tendencies, it is said. It is about time something was done.

The American Press, after saying it has been waiting the past three months for a pronouncement by Mr. Hays, says: "We do not believe Mr. Hays will stand for what has been going on," although this newspaper thinks that every day the devilish "art" now in vogue continues in the film theater, that day will bring its own story of harm done.

Mr. Hays is urged on all sides to CLEAN UP the films that are flooding the land with vile suggestions of moral indecencies. Attention is called to just a few of the suggestive titles of recent and it may be said "popular" film plays:

- "Sex Lure." "For Husbands Only." "Why Trust Your Husband?" "A Bachelor's Children." "My Unmarried Wife." "Playthings of Passion." "His Temporary Wife." "Lawless Love." "The Woman of Pleasure." "His Bridal Night." "The Fruits of Desire." "My Husband's Other Wife." "When Men Desire." "Flames of the Flesh."

Such titles tell their own story of the producers and the "perverts" who enjoy the scenes pictured.

The paper quoted above comments on the influence of such "stuff" on the minds of the youth of the country and says that while the city has stood for this for a long time the country will demand improvement in the character of the films. There is little doubt that the country localities demand a higher moral tone in their amusements than the cities do generally. The children go because they are pleased and amused by the pictures, not because of the sensational titles or situations presented.

"What do the children see? They see ribald horseplay, suggestive indecency and frequent sneering at religion. They see the Christian ministry held up to ridicule; people of good habit lampooned; crime and near-crime displayed; sex crime and near-sex crime that do even the grown ups no good—in general, spectacles that ruin the morals and make children insufferable companions and the poorest sort of citizens when they have grown up.

"Certain pictures have probably had as much to do, by way of suggestion, with the present crime wave as any other one cause.

"Will Hays has proved himself a great American. He has ability, is a magnificent administrator, and he is a patriot. We cannot conceive of a man like him adopting any other policy in the handling of this rotten situation than a vigorous, bloody "clean up" campaign.

"Country America will never permit what the city has stood for in pictures. But it is creeping in on them.

"All decent-minded people hope that the Hays Crusade will soon arrive."

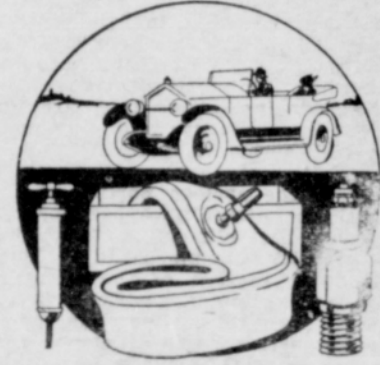
