

RAINFALL IMPROVES FARM CROPS OUTLOOK

The recent rainfall, while light, has helped the farming outlook considerably. The Oregon wheat crop looks more favorable since the rains. The winter oats are beginning to head in many localities. The late spring oats on high land are just coming up. The cutting of alfalfa has been delayed by the rain. Corn looks better in the warmer localities but it needs more rain.

Strawberries are filling the markets at the present time. The strawberry season, however, is expected to be short owing to the dry, hot weather which has prevailed. The recent rains benefitted the raspberry and loganberry crops greatly.

New potatoes are beginning to come into the markets from the southern part of the state. The planting of late potatoes is nearly completed. Garden vegetables were aided by the rains. The appearance of the hop fields at this time indicates a good crop. Sheep shearing is practically over.

The central Oregon counties have reported heavy showers.
