1925 Exposition Petitions Filed. The 1925 exposition petitions have been filed with the secretary of state at Salem with a total of 16,380 registered names listed as the result of circulation throughout the state.

As the result of the successful circulation of the petitions, the exposition measure to tax Portland \$3,000,000 will go on the ballot in the November election.

Sale of a \$1,000,000 stock issue will start the second phase of the financial program within a few weeks.

Radio on S. P. Train Sets New Record.

All transcontinental radio records were shattered by the wireless-equipped Shriner train of 12 cars carrying the Syrian Temple delegation from Cincinnati, Ohio, which was recently handled by the Southern Pacific.

Aerials were constructed eight inches above the roof of one of the forward cars and were 160 feet in total length.

The train left Cincinnati in radio touch with both coasts. At Denver, music programs were copied from the big radio stations at Pittsburgh and Chicago.

FLY EXTERMINATION IS URGED BY CLUB

"The Snappy Five" Home Making club of Gresham realize the danger of a fly to our public health and safety. The following are extracts from an O. A. C. pamphlet on the fly, which they found very beneficial to them in their fight against the fly, and would also be well for everyone to know if he expects to be healthy and happy.

The status of the house fly is very clearly defined as follows: Hatched in filth, bred in filth, living on filth, and without doubt the filthiest creature on earth. Knowing the above facts to be true, one may readily see why the housefly is one of the most dangerous of all living creatures and the one to be most feared on account of its apparent harmlessness.

1. Where is the fly hatched? In manure and filth. 2. Where does the fly live? In every kind of filth. 3. Is anything too filthy for the fly to eat? No.

4. (a) Where does he go when he leaves the vault and the manure pile and spittoon? Into the kitchen and dining room. (b) What does he do there? He walks on the bread, fruit, and vegetables; he wipes his feet on the butter and bathes in the butter-milk.

5. Does the fly visit the patient sick with consumption, typhoid fever, and cholera infantum? He does—and may call on you next.

6. Is the fly dangerous? He is man's worst pest, and more dangerous than wild beasts or rattlesnakes.

7. How shall we kill the fly? (a) Destroy all the filth about the house and yard; (b) pour lime into the vault and on the manure; (c) kill the fly with a screen paddle, or sticky paper, or kerosene oil.

Heretofore it has been the practice of most people to kill the fly after it has entered the house. But it is our aim to catch it, by fly traps before they gain their entrance and leave germs on everything they touch. Why not everyone try this plan and soon rid Gresham of flies?
