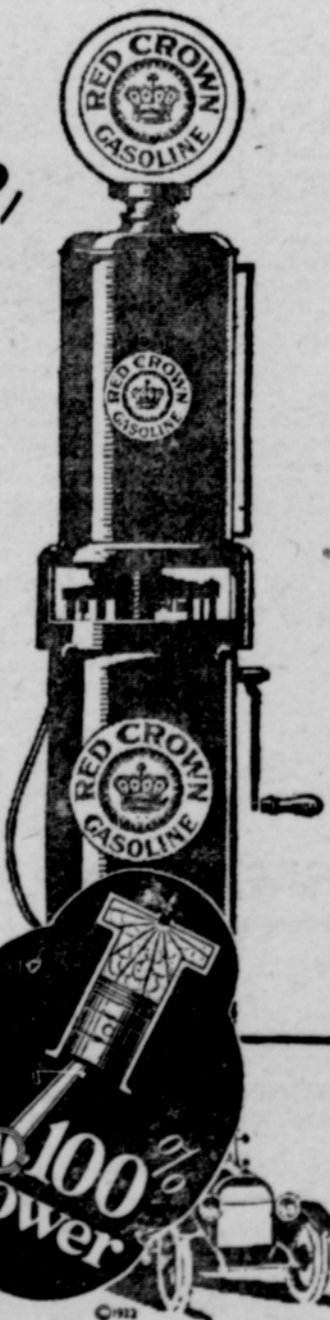

Edna McCreary has just recovered from an attack of tonsillitis.

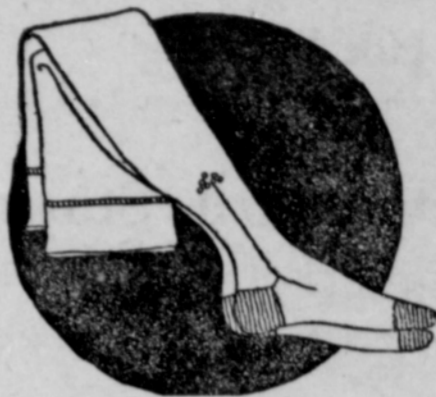

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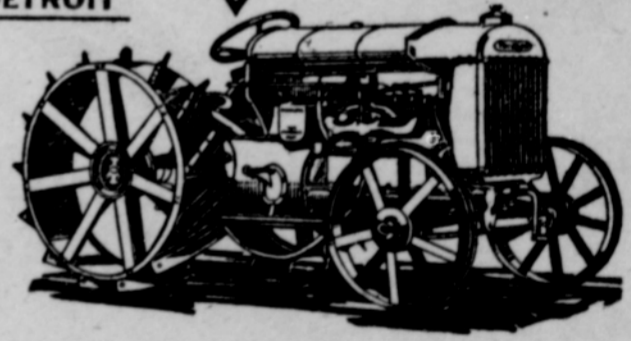
