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VOTE FOR THE BONDS.

Monday evening at the Union high school building legal voters of the district will vote on a small bond issue for the high school enlargement and improvement. Not over \$20,000 is asked for by the board of directors to use reconstructing and arranging the present gymnasium into class rooms and erecting a new building for gymnasium purposes.

The present class rooms are overcrowded and additional room is badly needed. The present gymnasium is inadequate for the increasing attendance.

The reconstruction, it is said, can be done at a minimum of expense for the additional facilities it will provide.

This is a move that will mean much for the future of the high school and the board should be heartily backed up by the voters in this needful undertaking.

NEAR EAST RELIEF MAKES STRONG APPEAL.

"I did not believe that any one could deliberately stand up in front of a group of children and pick out 20 of them to live and leave the rest to starve to death until I did it myself last summer in the Near East, said J. J. Handsaker, state director of the Near East relief in Oregon, when addressing a union meeting in the Methodist church in Gresham recently.

"We had stopped for two days at Erivan, a city of some 40,000 people, which lies at the foot of Mt. Ararat. Four thousand children were packed into our orphanages. I say packed for they were sleeping from two to five in a bed and they were single beds. Out on the streets were thousands of others for whom it was absolutely impossible to do anything.

"When the relief workers found that I had brought with me 20 suits of children's clothing which had been donated by friends in Portland, they said we will take in 20 more but I must pick them out.

"Imagine my horror when not 20 but 200 children presented themselves, the word having been passed around town that children would be taken in. The first I chose was a little naked girl, her body covered with vermin, filth and disease. Her little tummy bloated from gas caused from eating hay, grass, chaff or anything she could find.

"I spent all Sunday forenoon August 7th, 1921, in this task and after we had picked out the 20 I drove away as fast as I could hoping to escape before the children knew that we were leaving them to starve

to death. I did not get away quick enough and the sound of the wailing is still in my ears.

"The Near East Relief is feeding every day more than 100,000 children. These children love the American flag as American children cannot do. Had it not been for the American flag and the Near East Relief working under that flag practically all these children would have starved to death."

Mr. Handsaker told other incidents equally impressive, portraying the needy condition of the people and showing their appreciation of the work of the American Near East Relief. He showed two reels of motion pictures taken under his direction while in Armenia last summer.

Many in the audience were deeply affected at the sight of an American flag which Mr. Handsaker displayed, it being made by children who had never seen an American flag and so were not to blame for running the stripes in the wrong direction.

The meeting closed with an urgent request for letters and petitions to be sent to congress protesting against the continued slaughter of the Christians in the Near East and for contributions of both clothing and funds. More than \$200 in cash and clothing was subscribed at the meeting. PRUNE DRYING IS AIDED THROUGH MULTIVANE FANS

Oregon farmers are installing multivane fans to recirculate air in their prune driers under the direction of the horticultural products section of the Oregon Agricultural College Experiment station.

"The fans will mean a lot to prune driers in Oregon," says Prof. Ernest H. Wiegand, under whose direction work has done on the problem of using multivane fans to recirculate air. "The rate of circulation will be quadrupled. The air may be used over and over again, thus bringing about a saving in fuel."

The Eugene Fruit Growers association has adopted this system and is installing two large fans in a new type of drier recommended by the experiment station. This drier will be the first of its kind to be installed in Oregon and will have a capacity of 10 to 12 tons in 24 hours. Air will be passed over the fruit at the rate of 700 lineal feet a minute.

Others installing fans include C. R. Widner and Rudolph Ingerly of Albany, Jess Nichols of Irving, Dr. Scarborough of Creswell, L. M. Miller of Eugene, H. E. Hecker of Dillard, and C. T. Krogel of Roseburg.

These men will double the capacity of their driers by using the fans, according to Professor Wiegand, and will also increase the quality of their product by lowering the temperature.
