It was 55 seconds before Mr. Le Noir was free of all straps and had handed the straight jacket over for inspection. While this demonstration was given on the cement floor of the office Mr. Le Noir makes almost as good time suspended by one foot, head down. Mrs. Le Noir, who is with him, is also a queen in the art of getting out of straight jackets. She is the only woman in the United States, Mr. Le Noir says, who can free herself from a straight jacket while suspended in mid-air.

Besides escaping from chains, handcuffs, straight jackets, etc., both Mr. and Mrs. Le Noir are very clever in their work of illusions, magic and tricks. They do mind reading and crystal gazing stunts. It is said that Mrs. LeNoir is as clever as her husband in the tricks and stunts which they perform.

With their trick French dog, Queenie, Mr. and Mrs. Le Noir are making a cross continent advertising tour. They put on these exhibitions for any merchant, club, or society that wants good, clean advertising stunts.

They plan to give several exhibitions on the Multnomah county fair grounds each day during the week. Mr. Le Noir is an ex-service man and belongs to disabled American Veterans' organization at Seattle. He was wounded in the battle of the Argonne and has served two enlistments one in the navy and one in the army.

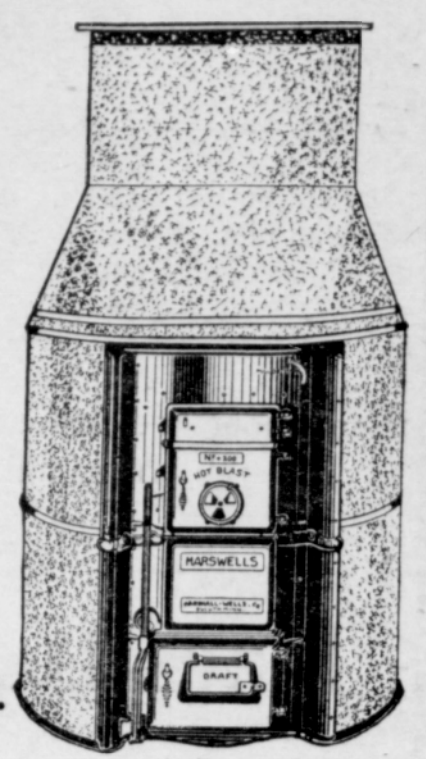

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
