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PLEASANT HOME HIKERS REACH MOUNTAIN TOP

A party of 12 hikers from Pleasant Home reached the summit of Mount Hood last Friday noon under the leadership of Orville Zimmerman of Gresham. The climb was made without accident or particular trouble but not without sickness for but very few of the party went through without at some time or the other on the top of the mountain, feeling that they had really started something that they couldn't finish. Pluck and endurance are the watch words of mountain climbers and so the party persisted until the summit was reached.

There were in the party that went to the top with the guide, Mrs. B. C. Altman, Mrs. Alta Gentry, Miss Gladys Miller, Misses Jennie and Eileen Sloop and Miss Anna Lenartz, Edgar Sloop, Wilbur Altman, Henry Brink, Raymond McGinnis, Chas. McKinney and Rev. E. B. Cotton. Others in the party who did not attempt the climb to the top of the mountain were Miss Mabel Johanson, Miss Wilma Chase and Miss Maud Smart of Portland. The latter was the guest of Mrs. Altman.

The party of 16 in four Ford cars left Pleasant Home between 9 and 10 o'clock Thursday morning. The party met at Sandy from which place they started together at a little after 11 o'clock and arrived without serious mishap at Government Camp about 4 p. m. At Government Camp the cars were put under cover and lunches were collected and then the start was made for the cabin which is four miles away and is a rather stiff grade to climb especially following a 40 mile drive in a flivver. The trip was made in two hours and ten minutes.

At the cabin lunch was prepared and eaten around the camp fire and the guide who was most efficient made beds and cooked coffee.

Lights went out in the cabin at 9:30 and everybody tried to sleep. Some folks did sleep and some could not but no one slept long because the alarm clock began its unwelcome music at 12:10 a. m.

The party amid groans arose and prepared for another four miles hike and climb up to the summit of the mountain which loomed so nearby. It was moonlight and that fact made the walking a little easier and kept the goal in sight during the early part of the trip.

About 1 1/2 hours were spent in the canyon leading up to the snow field. The broad snow field was reached about 3 a. m. At 5 o'clock the triangular morain was reached and the party took a longer time for resting and ate some raisins. The climbing grew a little harder as the time went on and after crossing the glaciers and climbing up to the crater it was 8:30. Here the party rested an hour while sandwiches were disposed of and faces painted. A plentiful supply of lamp black and cold cream turned the party into a delegation that looked like it had come from Dixie land. There is a beautiful lake in the crater this year which is unusual at this time of the year.

The climbing from this point on was more difficult and it took from 9:30 to 12:30 to make the next step of the journey. However the goal was reached at last and the entire group went "over the top" or at least to the point where they could look "over the top" at 12:30. After a short rest on top the descent was begun which proved very much easier than had been anticipated. The last 2 1/2 or 3 miles was one grand slide of which everyone took advantage.

A blue haze of smoke in the valleys gave one the feeling of being away from the world, isolated. The snow capped mountains were plainly visible but the country around Hood River, Portland and surrounding country was covered with smoke.

The trip back to Government Camp was made Friday evening.
