**War Veterans Aided.**

For the purpose of securing employment for disabled war veterans who have been rehabilitated vocationally, a campaign will be conducted throughout the northwest August 21 to 26 by the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, according to A. E. McCabe, district head of the newly organized employment section of the bureau. More than 900 veterans of Washington, Oregon and Idaho have completed their training courses and several hundred more are scheduled to finish their vocational work within the next two or three months, he stated.

"These fellows who could not carry on their pre-war vocations because of war injuries surely deserve consideration in the matter of employment," said Mr. McCabe. "They have struggled for months and in many cases years to master a new occupation. However, we are not asking employers to hire these veterans for sentimental reason but rather because they are now capable office workers, tradesmen or industrial workers. The Veterans' Bureau vouches that the rehabilitated service man will hold the job he is recommended for."

Employers are urged to get in touch with one of the branch offices of the Veterans' Bureau located in Seattle, Portland, Spokane, Tacoma, Boise and Pocatello during "Veterans' Employment Week."
