**METHODIST CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD MEETS**

Dr. D. D. Forsythe, secretary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension Workers of the Methodist church, with offices in Philadelphia, and Dr. Vermilia of the Bureau of Frontier work of the same board were in Portland Wednesday and attended a meeting of the Oregon Conference Board of Home Missions in session in First Church, Portland. A large program is being developed for all of the Oregon conference workers. It will follow the development plan of the present five-year period of the centenary which will close in June, 1924.
