YEARLY CAMP MEETING CLOSES AT TROUTDALE
The annual meeting of the Advent Christian church of the northwest closed at Troutdale recently after a successful session. Though an event of considerable interest to those in touch with the denomination, very little publicity has been given the meeting by the press and many do not realize that these gatherings have been held yearly for the past thirty-five years.
The Advent Christians hold many beliefs in common with the Seventh Day Adventists, but one point of difference is the keeping of the first day of the week as the sabbath.
The grounds are located on the west bank of the Sandy river just above the bridge at Troutdale. They are directly on the Columbia river highway and are easily accessible by automobile or by rail. They are owned by the church, which employs a caretaker the year around to look after the property. A home has been built on the grounds for the caretaker where tents, cots and bedding are also kept for the use of the members when they attend the meeting each year. A cook tent is also put up each year where meals are served in cafeteria style. The tents are in long rows, numbering 75 and 80 tents in all, with streets laid out between the rows.
People come each year from Montana, Idaho, California, Washington, and Oregon to attend the meetings. There were about 600 people in attendance this year. The meetings began August 9 and closed August 26. Ministers of the denomination came from many states to preach. One old gentleman, a retired minister, attends the camp meeting every year in spite of the fact that he is now 84 years old. He is B. F. Bonney from Malino, California. He is the second cousin of Mrs. L. P. Manning of Gresham.
Mr. Bonney, accompanied by his wife, visited at the Manning home on Saturday and Mr. and Mrs. Manning attended the closing day of the camp meeting with them.
The Rev. Mr. Jenks from the Aurora college preached the sermon on the closing day. Antiphonal music had been prepared by the choir which was made up of over 50 voices. Some of the singers crossed the river and stood on the rocky cliff overlooking the stream and sang to the listeners on the opposite side. The remainder of the choir on the bank answered them. The effect produced was very inspiring. The soft notes, as they died away, left the hearers spellbound. The ceremony was a very impressive one and all present left the scene with memories long to be cherished.

Geo. T. Murray of Company B, 2d Oregon Volunteers, died at the age of 75 years at Roseburg Soldiers Home, August 29. He served under Lieut. Cyrus Walker in Indian war on the Pacific Coast in 1862-3.
He was born in Troy, Ohio, and crossed the plains by ox team in 1861. He is survived by one son, Walter L. Murray of Sherwood, Oregon, two daughters, Mrs. Annie Toni and Mrs. Maud Olaf of Banning, California. Two sisters, Mrs. J. A. Stephens of Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. Mary D. Stoker of Piqua, Ohio, two brothers, Orland Murray of Retzel, Washington, and J. W. Murray of Salem, Oregon, both Civil War veterans. He was an old resident of Pleasant Home for a number of years where he leaves a circle of friends. He was a member of M. A. Ross Post G. A. R. of Gresham, Oregon.
