Chas. E. Wheeler, who had made the his home in one of the buildings at the Multnomah county fair grounds, died in a Portland hospital the first part of last week. He was 72 years of age and was suffering from dropsy, which caused his death.
Mr. Wheeler was taken ill about two weeks ago and was being cared for at the home of Dick Jennings near the fair grounds. When he failed to recover, the county authorities were notified. Miss Mary Billmeyer, county health nurse, came out to investigate. She had the sick man removed

to a Portland hospital where he passed away. As far as is known he had no relatives in this part of the country.

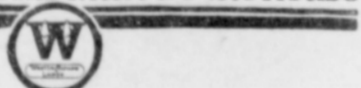

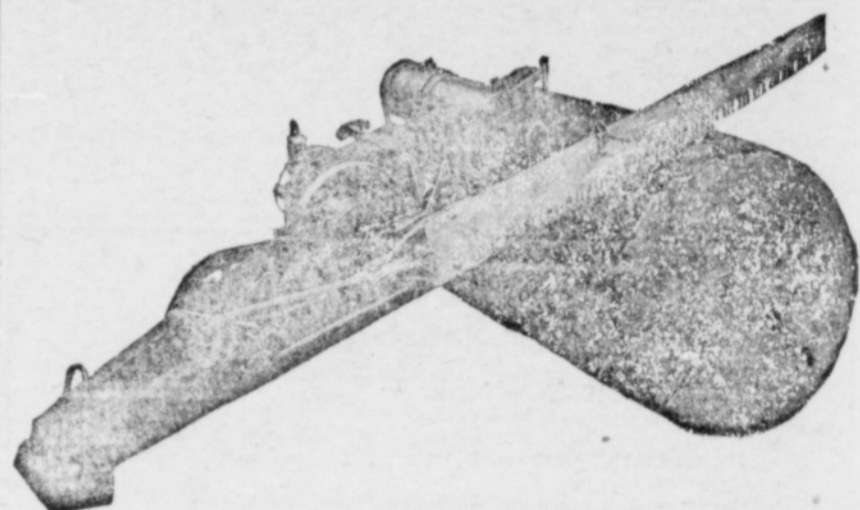
