### EDWARD ROBT. WRIGHT IS LAID TO FINAL REST

The funeral services of Edward Robert Wright were held from the Methodist Episcopal church in Gresham on Thursday afternoon by the Rev. E. D. Blackman, pastor of the Free Methodist church. Music was furnished by members of the church choir. The pall bearers were Chas. Gedamke of Portland, George and John Sleret, Fred Ruegg, Byron Emery and Wm. Stanley, all early friends of Mr. Wright. Interment was in the family lot in the Gresham cemetery. Both rooms of the church were necessary to seat the large number of people who came to pay their respects to the memory of an old friend.

Mr. Wright was born in Wisconsin September 28, 1865. He moved with his parents to Iowa when a small child and to Oregon in 1879. He was a resident of Multnomah county since that time and of the home farm for many years. His father, Edward T. Wright, died in December, 1891, and his mother in October, 1911. A sister, Mrs. Clara Kane, passed away at her home in Gresham a few years ago. Another sister, Mrs. Mina Carter of Lansing, Michigan, survives him.

On February 22, 1891, Mr. Wright married Miss Annie Wilkes of Rockwood. To them were born seven children, five of whom survive. Edward R. and Annie died in childhood. He is survived by his widow and the following children: Mrs. Geneva Johnson of Corbett, Mrs. Gladys Hogg of Portland, Miss Lena, Ellis and Joe Wright of the family home.

Mr. Wright has not been well for many years and has been a great sufferer. Seven years ago he underwent two serious major operations and after a slow recovery enjoyed fairly good health for a part of the time, but for the last few years has been ill most all of the time. On August 29, last, he was operated on again at a Portland hospital for ulcers of the stomach. He came through the operation very well and high hopes were held of his recovery until the morning of his death, September 5, when he was suddenly taken worse and died in a few hours.

### Racket Store Holds Successful Opening.
