brought together four school districts in a new bond of fellowship, helpfulness and brotherhood. A great deal of neighborhood rivalry has melted before the fires of friendly cooperation. Leading speakers from the state schools, colleges and churches have been brought to the community to speak at the two annual farmers institutes. Big community meetings have been held at different times including several entertainments, notable among which was the masquerade party and program February 22d at the grange hall. A district Sunday school association has been in operation for the past three years and has brought in well-trained and inspirational workers twice a year to discuss better Sunday school methods. A community Sunday school picnic has been given on the Fourth of July the past two years and has proven an enjoyable occasion both times. He planned and carried out to success the vacation Bible school, probably the first in the open country to be held in the state.

Mr. Cotton has seemed untiring and tireless in social work in the four Parent-Teacher associations, the grange, the schools and the churches. While his work in social lines has meant much to the community it is perhaps in his effect on the lives of the individual members that has counted most for the success of his work, as evidenced by the growth of the church at Pleasant Home. Four years ago the total membership was 52, it is now about 120 including 19 non-resident members. Four years ago the average attendance at Sunday school was 25; it is now between 50 and 60. The teachers are studying and the work is upon a substantial basis. There has never been any big jumps ahead but merely the steady growth of a careful, thoughtful, prayerful pastor.

At the beginning of the last conference year when Mr. Cotton began his work at Kimball college in Salem, Mrs. Alta M. Gentry was secured to act as director of religious education, or pastor's assistant, with especial emphasis on the Sunday school work, visiting and social activities. These two workers with an increasingly large and effective corps of assistants have made the last year one of the most fruitful of the entire four in spite of the fact that Mr. Cotton has spent part of his time at college. A net gain of 29 members for the year was reported to conference and there has not been an evangelistic meeting as such, on the charge for at least 18 months.

Small wonder that the church and the community both feel that a friend and most effective worker is leaving.

Rev. Mr. Cotton, who leaves here Friday, will preach at Willamina the coming year and finds himself promoted to a church that, during the past few years, has made rapid progress. Willamina is a town of some 300 population. It is a center more thickly settled than the Pleasant Home charge and only about 30 miles from Salem. It is not only a promotion and a splendid opportunity for the type of work in which Mr. Cotton is so effective, but it is more conveniently located to the college where he will continue his school work.

It was a source of satisfaction to his friends to learn recently that he was about to abandon his bachelor career and that the date was fixed for the coming Thanksgiving season. The bride-to-be is Miss Ruth Wheelton of New Plymouth, Idaho, a charming young nurse who was graduated a year or more ago from the Methodist Deaconesses hospital at Spokane, Washington. The wedding will occur in Idaho and is the culmination of a friendship begun in that state when the couple were still in their early teens. Friends of Mr. Cotton throughout both eastern Multnomah and northern Clackamas counties will wish for them both all success in their new home and new work at Willamina.
