MRS. R. I. ANDERSON RELEASED FROM PAIN

Mrs. R. I. Anderson, who has been in ill health for the past four years and confined to her bed for the greater part of the past year, passed away at Orient on Saturday, September 16. The funeral services were held at Pleasant Home Methodist church on Monday and the body was laid to rest in Pleasant Home cemetery, followed by loving relatives and friends, who attested their affection by a profusion of floral gifts. The funeral sermon was by Dr. Leonard W. Riley, president of Linville College at McMinnville. The Rev. David Q. Barry offered prayer. Music was furnished by a quartet consisting of Mrs. J. M. Hilliard, Mrs. Leonard Lauderback, E. E. Van Fleet and B. C. Altman, with Mrs. M. Lennartz at the organ. The pall bearers were B. C. and C. W. Altman, W. E. Markell, C. M. Quicksall, L. L. Kidder and Will Metzger. The services at the cemetery were in charge of the Eastern Star.

Dr. Riley read a series of references from the scripture which were comforting and appropriate. In his remarks which followed he spoke of the devoted Christian life of Mrs. Anderson, of her faithfulness in every service, of her helpful influence in her home and in the community. "She looked into the future calmly and without fear, knowing that to be absent from the body is to be at home with the Lord," said Dr. Riley. The following obituary was read:

Mrs. Katie Maxwell Anderson was born at Orient, Oregon, June 18, 1873, on the old home farm of the Maxwells. She died at Orient near her birth place, September 16, 1922, at the age of 49 years, 2 months, 28 days.

She received her education in the Orient grade school and one year at Mt. Tabor.

In her girlhood she became a member of the Pleasant Home Baptist church and has lived a beautiful Christian life ever since. On September 12, 1901, she was married to R. I. Anderson. They have made their home in this vicinity ever since, except two years in Yamhill county and two years at Firwood. She has been an ideal wife and mother and was dearly beloved by all who knew her. During the four years of her illness she has been ever patient, cheerful and courageous, never uttering one word of complaint.

Mrs. Anderson was a charter member of Multnomah grange and a member of the Eastern Star.

She is survived by her husband, two sons, Will and Nick, three step-sons, Max, George and Isaac, as well as four sisters and one brother, Mrs. May Spaulding, Portland, Mrs. Elnora Scoville, Pioneer, Oregon, Mrs. Myrtle Johnson and Mrs. Louise Nelson of Pleasant Home and Wilmer Maxwell of Spokane.

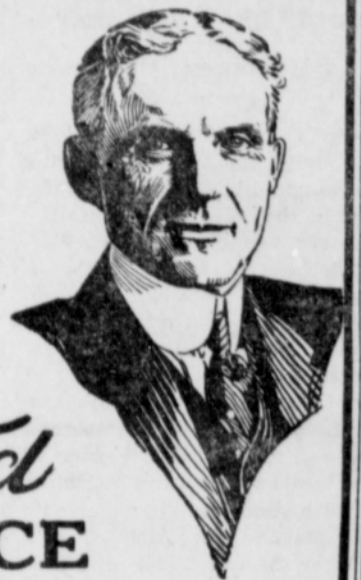

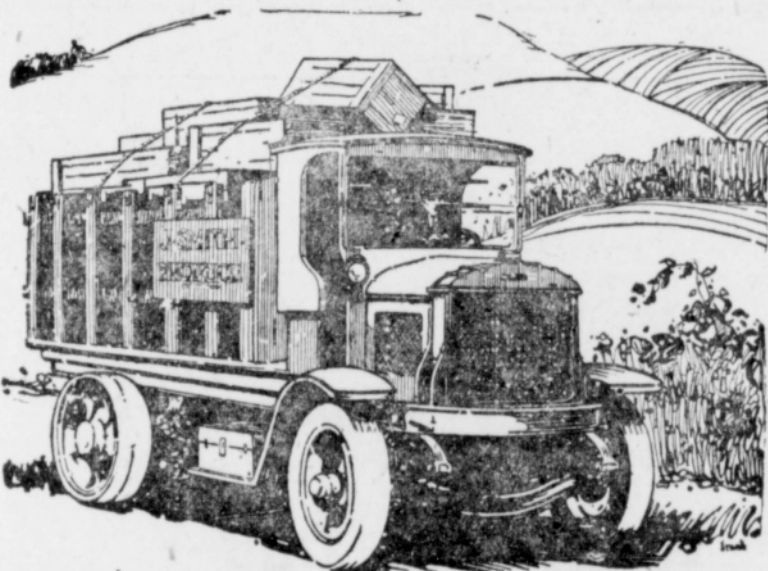
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
