### FORMER GRESHAM MAN TO ATTEND RIO EXPO.

Emil Lauber, formerly a resident of Gresham, will leave in a few days for Rio de Janeiro, where he expects to attend the world exposition celebrating the one hundredth year of the independence of the Republic of Brazil.

Mr. Lauber was in Gresham on Wednesday visiting old friends after an absence of two and one-half years on ships in the merchant marine. During this time he has been to Australia, on some of the South Sea Islands, in and all around the continent of South America, to Mexico, Panama, Europe and has just returned from a voyage in which he touched at ports on both sides of the North American continent. He has a trip planned now which will take him all over the world and expects to be away for the next four years. He

ships to some port where he wants to look over the country and, spends all the time he wants to there, then takes another ship to the next port he wants to see.

Mr. Lauber holds a second mate's license. During the time he has been in the merchant marine he has been on six ships, all boats flying the American flag, except one which was an Australian three-masted bark. Of the five American ships four were steamers and one a windjammer. During the war Mr. Lauber was in the United States' navy.

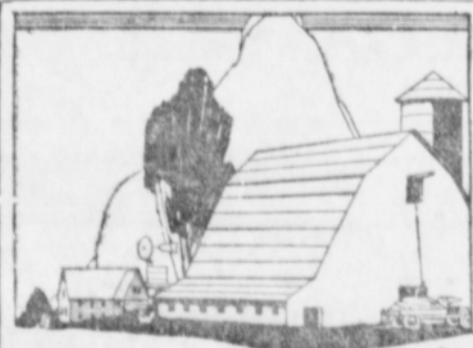
