IMPROVE THE METHOD.

The Oregonian closes an editorial on "Playing the Game" with this paragraph:

"But so long as the primary has certain rules, and there is no other way to play the political game, he is a poor loser who refuses to accept its results after taking a hand with full understanding of the whole scheme."

That is the sentiment the Outlook has wanted for some time to express or be able to credit to as broad and fair-minded a source as the Oregonian.

Many see and have long seen some serious defects in the present primary law. Some have said away with it and back to the old system. But the old system couldn't be worked now with satisfaction except to a few political bosses. But the primary law will have to be changed or the reaction will be radical. The voters, we believe a large majority of the more thoughtful ones, are quite disgusted with the tendency on the part of some aspirants to refuse to accept the verdict of the electors at the primary and "run independent" at the later election. But the voters generally show their disapproval.

Of course, that is only one small item. The principal objection, as we view it, is that the present primary system defeats its own chief purpose, namely, the nomination of the best party leaders of the dominant parties for public office. Let the voters decide as between parties and issues. Let the party organizations, which are democratic in constitution, decide what issues they shall stand for and what men can best represent them in formulating and carrying out those issues. It is a safe and sane method. The other does not put the best men forward and jumbles up political issues until no one knows whether we are tending. Too many candidates are mere office seekers and stand for anything to get the job.

SMYRNA AND OREGON.

Two Oregon women are in that part of the Near East where war, fire, massacre, starvation and disease are taking the lives of multiplied thousands, according to J. J. Handsaker, state director of Near East Relief. Miss Margaret Hinman of Forest Grove is at Brousa, recently captured by the Turks. Mrs. Amy Burt of Bend is in Constantinople caring for 1000 orphans in a Turkish military school building.

Two hundred thousand Christian people fled from their homes to Smyrna before the victorious Turkish army, many dying on the hundred mile trek under broiling sun through fought-over country.

Then came massacre and fire in which countless thousands perished, thousands have fled to the hills only to find death there, and this morning (Wednesday, September 20) 50,000 or more are huddled on the wharves at Smyrna without food or water, maimed, wounded, disease ridden—their only hope, American Relief.

Mothers in bitter anguish and despair are thrusting their babies into the sea.

In this place of torment are six Near East Relief workers, among them H. C. Jaquith, who rescued 450 boys in one group, and Major Davis, described in today's dispatches as "the silent hero of the day." The Near East Relief is the one steady influence. Two shipments of Near East Relief supplies, milk, beans, flour and rice, have been dispatched.

This food was in reserve for our 110,000 children, who look daily to us for life. It must be replaced or many will die.

Statistics show that 3,000 automobiles were struck at grade crossings in this country last year. In these accidents, over 2,600 men, women and children were killed and over 3,000 others injured. In dozens of instances whole families, numbering from four to six were wiped out as completely as though a cyclone had struck them. A cyclone comes without warning, from an unexpected quarter. A train of cars always comes along a permanent track, so you know where to find it. And yet, this very day, more than one driver, somewhere, will heedlessly drive onto the tracks, without looking or listening and there a rushing train will demolish his car. In company with wife and children he may meet sudden death.
